In the last, renowned personalities who took reigns of their lives in their own hands and became invincible and unstoppable further put ice on the cake and reiterate the main idea of not judging someone. These include Boxer Muhammad Ali, Cristiano Ronaldo, Barack Obama, Steve Jobs and Helen Keller. Therefore, one should never be shallow enough to judge someone on the basis of something which was not in one's hands, but on something which one purposely chose.

Greeks are considered as father of science and every piece of science has roots that can be dated back to Greeks. Among them, Plato is considered as one of the central figure of ancient Greek. Being an idealist, Plato gave his theory of Idealism in which he states that what is seen in this world is actually a copy or imitation of what that is in real world. Plato developed this theme of Reality vs Perception which became centre of themes that dominated literature for centuries. Reality vs Perception states that it is not reality what can be seen and heard as Descartes said that senses can also deceive. Therefore, one should not judge someone on the basis of what one sees. It does not matter what someone is born, but what someone chooses to be.

Among a number of philosophical ideas that reiterate that one must strive to change one's life, Transcendentalism by Ralph Waldo Emerson remains the crucial one. It states that one should tread a new path of reconciliation with inner self to change their course of life instead of following the prevalent norms of the society. This would help one to strive for self-attainment and betterment as

one is judged on what he becomes. To illustrate, Emerson said, "what lies behind us, and what lies before us are tiny matters compared to what lies within us." Therefore, one must strive for betterment by following one's inner self and change one's course of life.

Nietzsche is often labelled as negator of God and nihilist for his immoral views on God. For example, Nietzsche said, "God is Dead. God remains dead. We have killed Him." (Friedrich Nietzsche, The Gay Science, 1882). Nietzsche did not negate God.

Rather, he perceived death of God as a liberating force. He believed that God cannot be perceived objectively, but rather God is an objective reality. Therefore, one should not confine to prevalent beliefs and must strive to find one's own path to prevail in society.

Last but not the least, Sartre's Existentialism condemns the notion of leaving everything to God and reinstates the need to prioritize oneself. Sartre, one of the influential figures

of 20th century, reinforces in his Existentialist philosophy that man figures out everything in his life except how to live. One cannot rely on God for everything he does, but he must tread his own path and reach his own pavillion. Sartre said, "Existence precedes and rules essence." To sum up, one must take reigns of his life and do everything that can be in one's favour.

Literature is the reflection of life. It depicts the social, political, economical, psychological and prevalent beliefs belonging to that era. Similarly, literature has been used to depict the theme that one should not be judged on what he was born, but what one has become.

To start with, literature has been used to depict that someone's skin colour does not determine one's character. Harper Lee, in her masterpiece novel, *To Kill a Mockingbird*, sketches the character of Atticus Finch who is a renowned white lawyer and fighting a case in favour of a black man. The black man, named Tom, was wrongly accused of raping a white lady just for the fact that he was black. whereas,

For example, Atticus says to his daughter, "You never really understand a person until you climb into his skin and walk around in it." (Harper Lee, *To Kill a Mockingbird*) To conclude, it is absurd to judge someone's character on the basis of one's skin colour and lineage.

Furthermore, literature has presented that being orphan does not restrain one to achieve big in life. Charlotte Bronte, in her famous novel, *Jane Eyre*, draws the character of Jane Eyre who was a born orphan, but she never let anyone to mortify her pride. Jane refuses to settle for less in her life and set precedent that who she was born does not matter, but what matters is how she grows into. Jane Eyre says, "I am no bird; and no net ensnares me; I am a free human being with an independent will." (Charlotte Bronte, *Jane Eyre*)

In conclusion, Bronte, through *Jane Eyre*, reiterates that nothing restrains one to achieve big in life.

Third, literature also depicts that age and background do not define one's will power. Lucy Montgomery, in her classic novel, *Anne of the Green Gables*, draws the character of Anne Shirley Gilbert who was orphan, brought up in orphanage and only 11 when she was adopted. However, she was ahead of her age, had bravery, imaginative power and inquisitive mind. She shunned all the barriers posed by her life and chooses to become an intellectual independent lady. She says, "Next to trying and winning, the best is trying and failing." (Lucy Montgomery, *Anne of the Green Gables*). Thus, it does not matter, as explained by Montgomery, how one is born and where, but how one chooses to be matters more.

In addition to these, literature has also explained that gender does not confine one to particular roles. Jane Austen, in her renowned novel, *Pride and Prejudice*, illustrates the character of Catherine Bennet who does not let her gender define her capabilities and ambitions. She proves herself to be an equal of male protagonist and never let him belittle her. To illustrate, she says, "Do not consider me now as an elegant female intending to

play you, but as a rational creature speaking the truth from her heart."

(Jane Austen, Pride and Prejudice)

Thus, Jane Austen, in her novel, presses the idea that what weighs more is the result and not how things were started.

Moreover, literature has also depicted that morality and ethics are not confined to one's social status.

Charles Dickens, in his famous novel, The Great Expectations, has drawn

the character of Pip, who is a poor boy with moral and ethical values, years to attain social mobility and material wealth. However, he gradually

realizes in his journey of attaining wealth that he forsake his values for social status and delves into the pits of guilt. To explain, he says, "In a

word I was too cowardly to do what I knew to be right, as I had been too cowardly to avoid doing what I knew to be wrong." (Charles Dickens, The Great

Expectations) Therefore, Dickens reinstates the idea that social status does not determine one's values.

In the last, literature presents that emancipation of either man or woman is earned by embracing individuality. Zora Neal Hurston, in her novel, Their Eyes were watching God draws the character of Janie who was belittle first for being woman and then for being black. Janie chooses to chase her horizon and finds her voice as a black woman in a world dominated by men and gatekept by white people. For instance, she says, "Some people could look at a mud puddle and see an ocean with ships." (Zora Neal Hurston, Their Eyes were watching God). To sum up, Hurston explains that how one turns into matters more and not how one used to be.

Uphreaval in the society has resulted into numerous revolutions and movements in the world that has made the history. They all started with a purpose, but how it ended decides the consequences of the movement. Therefore, it does not matter how a thing is started. What weighs more is how it ended.
