2) Difference between Deen and Religion:

2.1) What is Religion?:

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religion in the following words, "the belief in and worship of a superhuman controlling power, especially a personal God or gods". In contextual terms, religion refers to the bond between man and God.

2.2) Definition of Religion by famous Personalities:

2.2.1) Edward Tylor:

Edward is a notable figure primarily hailed for his services in the sphere of Anthropology. Shedding light on this topic, Tylor claims that religion is simply the belief in spiritual beings.

2.2.2) Emile Durkheim:


Underscoring this phenomenon, Napoleon states, "It is only religion that can prevent the social evils not law."
