Everyone, I believe, who is at all sensible to the seductions of oetry, can remember some moment in youth when he or she was completely carried way by the work of one poet. What happens is a kind of fundation, or invasion of the undeveloped personality, the empty (swept and arnished) room, by the stronger personality of the poet. Wide reading is not valuable as a kind of hoarding, and the cumulation of knowledge or what sometimes is meant by the term 'a well-stocked ind.' It is valuable because in the process of being affected by one powerful resonality after another, we cease to be dominated by anyone, or by any small imber. The very different views of life, cohabiting in our minds, affect each other, and ir own personality asserts itself and gives each a place in some arrangement peculiar our self.
