the next ingredient is very important: Good Temper. "Love is The next and provoked." Nothing could be more striking than to this here. We are inclined to look upon bad temper as a very harmless weakness. We speak of it as a mere infirmity of nature, harmless failing, a matter of temperament; not a thing to take into serious account in estimating a man's character. And yet here, right in the heart of this analysis of love, it finds a place; and the Bible again and again returns to condemn it as one of the most destructive elements in human nature. The peculiarity of ill temper is that it is the vice of the virtuous. It is often a blot on an otherwise noble character. You know men who are all but perfect, and women who will be entirely perfect, but for an easily ruffled quick-tempered or 'touchy' disposition. This compatibility of ill temper and high moral character is one of the strangest and saddest problems of ethics. The truth is that there are two great classes of sins - sins of the body and the sins of disposition. The Prodigal son may be taken as a type of the first, the Elder Brother of the second. Now the society has no doubt whatever as to which of these is the worse. Its brand falls without a challenge, upon the Prodigal. But are we right? We have no balance to weigh one another's sins, and a courser or finer are but human words; but faults in the higher nature may be less venial than those on the lower, and to the eye of Him who is love, a sin against love may seem a hundred times more base. No form of vice, not worldliness, not greed of gold, not drunkenness does more harm to an unchristianized society than evil temper. For embittering life, for breaking up communities, for destroying the most sacred relationships, for devastating homes, for withering up men and women, for taking the bloom off childhood; in short for sheer gratuitous misery-producing power, this influence stands alone. Jealously, anger, pride, uncharity, cruelty, self-righteousness, touchiness, doggedness, sullenness—in various proportions - are the ingredients of all ill temper. Judge if such sins of the disposition

are not worse to live in, and for others to live with, than sins of the body. There is really no place in heaven for a disposition like this. A man with such a mood could only make heaven miserable for all the people in it.
