Ans:- Introduction

The concept of deen and Religion are often used interchangeably, yet they carry distinct meanings in Islamic and general contexts. Deen refers to a comprehensive way of life, encompassing spiritual, moral, social and legal aspects, guiding individuals in every facet of their existence. It's a holistic system of living in submission to the creator. Religion, on the other hand, tends to be more confined, often focusing on rituals, beliefs and practices that connect people to the divine.

Understanding the difference between Deen and Religion is essential to grasp how Islam presents itself as more than just a set of religious practices, but as a complete way of life.

Differences

i In the Quran and Hadith, the term Deen is consistently used to describe Islam, emphasizing it as a comprehensive way of life that governs every aspect of human existence, from personal conduct to societal laws. The word Madhab, however, typically refers to schools of thought or sects within Islam, which emerged over time as interpretations and jurisprudential differences developed among scholars. The Quran and Hadith do not recognize Islam as a mere religion confined to rituals or dogma, but as a complete deen, encompassing spiritual, moral, social and legal dimensions.

The use of Islam in the Quran is described as "the true religion with Allah", indicating that it is not about divisions or sectarian affiliations but about submitting to Allah's guidance in its purest form.

Therefore, while Madhab denotes

human-derived interpretations or practices with Islam. Deen represents the original and comprehensive submission to Allah's will, which remains the essence of Islam according to divine texts.

"Indeed, the true religion (Deen) with Allah is Islam."

ii Lexically deen means, reward and punishment. Religion denotes belief of individual. Technically, deen means a consummate code of life.
