

Oracles of Ancient Greece

The passage traces man's adamant belief in divinity to the dilemmas of life and connection with God to the emancipation from frailty. Resultantly, ~~man~~ ^{man} accepted God's will, which ancient Greek interpreted as prophecy.

The prophets explained oracles on the basis of omens of natural phenomena like thunder, lightning, fire, and rain.

Onirocriticism was popular, then and renowned prophets like Tiresias, Calchas and Cassandra are mentioned. Occasionally God did not provide oracles but directly contact with prophets through ecstasy.

These messages were then referred to any kind of God. According to the passage Apollo was the key messenger of God Zeus and responsible for the interpretation of important Oracle Dodona at Delphi.
