Expository / Descriptive: Simple stance by examiner just follow it, no hard language used to make the statement universal; in some cases direct questions to WHAT, WHY, and HOW often asked; straightforward information about a topic is asked.

<u>Literary</u>: Extended form of Descriptive topics but with abstract statements; no two-sided statement (like contrast or compare); no clear direction is given so one has to use one's imagination to create relevant arguments.

<u>Argumentative</u>: Statement that seems biased; use of hard language (use of Must, Should, Only, etc) in statement to portray subjective statement as objective; in some cases there is comparison or contrast too.
