Shah Waliullah

Introduction:

Shah Waliullah's movement was a pioneering effort in the sub-continent, aimed at socio-politico-religion and economic reformation of the Muslim communities that had degenerated over time. III. Social and Moral Revival

Shah Waliullah recognized that removing doctrinal differences was insufficient; Muslims also needed moral guidance.
