Philosophical ideas that reiterate that honesty and honest people always stand out in a crowd include Emerson's Transcendentalism and God is Dead by Nietzsche. Albert Camus' Absurdism and Existentialism by Sartre further shed light on the firm legacy of honesty. To free the heart from temporal desires, honesty has spectacular implications, such as it increases the notion of trust and sets a finest example. Moreover, people who lead a life of honesty are always remembered in good words and altogether, they make world a better place to live. Second, the philosophy of Existentialism by Sartre also sheds lights on being honest with oneself. Sartre challenges the perceived notion that essence precedes existence and says that this philosophy is made by man to make an excuse of his failure! Sartre says that it is existence which precedes essence and one makes own essence through the choices one makes and he drives his own life. Sartre through existentialism explains one to be honest in life by taking the responsibility of life. He

says, "Existence precedes and rules essence". To sum up, Sartre tells people to be honest in their lives rather than letting others to drive his life steering.

Furthermore, Absurdist philosophy of Albert Camus reinstates the need to be honest and not wait for any messiah to rescue oneself. Absurdism philosophy revolves around the idea that life is meaningless and even though man tries to take the steering of life in one's own hands, he would gain nothing. So the man waits for something to happen to give meaning to his life.

Albert Camus reinforces the idea that life itself is absurd with no meaning and man has to put his own efforts to fill colours in his life. The person who practices honesty and truthfulness in life remains alive even after his death. She says, "I am happy as I am, and love my liberty too well to be in a hurry to give it up for any mortal man." (Louisa May Alcott, Little Women). Virginia Woolf in her book 'A Room of One's Own' embarks on the journey where she writes about the prevailing patriarchy, phallocentric views and misogyny of society. She says, "The history of men's opposition to women's emancipation is more interesting perhaps than the story of that emancipation itself." (Virginia Woolf, A Room of One's Own, 1929) To sum up, Woolf utilizes the attitude of honesty to reveal the patriarchal norms of society.

In addition to these, literature has also presented the importance of honesty amidst the hypocrisy of materialistic world. Charles Dickens sketches the character of Pip in his famous novel 'The Great Expectation' to critique the Marxist ideology of society. Dickens through Pip shows the importance of innocence and honesty when he gets to live in upper class society and forsakes all morals and ethics to attain social mobility only to lose everything at the end. He says, "In a word, I was too

cowardly to do what I knew to be right, as I had been too cowardly to avoid doing what I knew to be wrong. (Charles Dickens, The Great Expectations)

Thus, Dickens emphasizes the importance of honesty in the hypocritic and material world.

Moreover, literature has also explained the truth of man's real value in a material world. Franz Kafka, renowned writer, writes in his novella about Gregor Samsa who spends all his life like a commodity to earn and serve his family. What he did not realize that he was not being honest with his own life and living life like a man whose sole worth is how much money he is making.

Gregor after realizing this says, "I cannot make you understand. I cannot make anyone understand what is happening inside me. I cannot even explain it to myself." (Franz Kafka, Metamorphosis) To conclude, Kafka emphasizes the need to remain honest with oneself to attain felicity.

In the last, literature has also revealed the importance of giving voice to inner-self is honesty to oneself. James Joyce, the pioneer of stream of consciousness, draws the character of

Stephan Duddles who tries to get himself fit in the society and suppresses his inner-self. He joins various religious and political parties to stay relevant in the societal trends only to get existential crisis at the end of the book where he stands at the dead end. Stephan gradually realizes how dishonest he had been with himself and then treads on a new path where he would nurture his individuality and character.
