"All of the mankind is from Adam and Eve and Allah has favored the Arabs over the non-Arabs and the Quraysh over the Arabs.... There is no superiority of an Arab over a non-Arab, or a non-Arab over an Arab, or a red (skinned) person over a black (skinned) person and vice versa, except in piety."
