The bureaucratic structure is inherited from the colonial evanis a crucial element in understanding The persistence of the edonial mentality in parision. The British introduced a héerarchial and centralized administrative system designed to serve imperial interests. The Bureaucratic machinery, characterized by red Tape, in post-colonial pakistan. This Continuity has led to a resistance to change and a perpetuation of hierarchial and autocratic decision making porocesses.
