Additionally, domestic violence which is a threat to women empowerment which make them restricted to their home. Furthermore, the patriarchal mindset restricting women from to become economically independent. Lastly, the gap between laws on papers and and enforcement and legal discrimination hindering women to get justice. These above mentioned

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factors make women empowerment myths; however there is another school of thought who believe that women empowerment is reality in Pakistan. Therefore to make it reality there is a dire need to take some effective measures.

The women empowerment refers to the process of enhancing women's autonomy, access to available opportunities, basic resources of education, decision making authority and ability to participate in all political aspects of life. In short, an environment where women have equal rights comparable to men. However, there are other several types of empowerment such as Economic empowerment, social empowerment, and Political empowerment.

Moreover, Pakistan is going through multiple crises, the chief among them is economic crisis where women empowerment is only remedy. It can be seen how women are playing effective role in western countries. In Pakistan; however, cultural norms and patriarchal mindsets continue to impede their full empowerment unless this mindset exists in Pakistan. Pakistan can never truly free itself from the curse of oppression.

The development of any country heavily depends on the combined efforts of men and women. Despite some progress still literacy rate of female education in Pakistan remained abysmal, low which clearly shows that Pakistan is still suffering from the curse of women oppression. Additionally, there are several factors which make it more difficult for girls to get education such as cultural norms, harassment, lack of awareness and poor government policies. ~~More than 20 million girls are out of school and more than 26% girls have never attended school.~~ In the ruler

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areas of Pakistan, parents often see girls as a burden. They believe that investment in girls' education is a waste of time and resources. For instance, Bangladesh is a part of Pakistan, but its women's literacy rate is 75% which is more than that of Pakistan. Due to the lack of women's and prioritizing women's education that helps Bangladesh to flourish its economy and way of living life. To conclude, education is the backbone of women empowerment and the recurrent situation of women in Pakistan is the result of negligence of the state. It shows women empowerment is myths in Pakistan.

Women's population in Pakistan is more than fifty percent. Despite this, the women of Pakistan is suppressed by the patriarchal family system whether it is father, husband, brother or father. Moreover, patriarchal system refers to as the cultural and tradition provides the rights and power to men to make decisions of the whole things even about the women whether man is their father, uncle, brother or husband. Due to male dominance in society, women are deprived from their basic rights like liberty, and property and are deprived from

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to exercise their decision making power in any aspect of life even regarding their marriages. These women are becoming the victim of patriarchal system, contributing to the perception that women empowerment is myths in Pakistan.

Moreover, women who exercise their autonomous right to marry or free will or seek a divorce they become the victim of honor killing. This abnormal and amoral traditional practices often carried out by the family members on the name protecting family honor. Mothers who lose their daughter by honor killing often suffer the deep trauma. A recent highlighted case, Reema Bibi who was shot dead by her father in their family home in KPK in November 2023.

In Pakistan around 5,000 honor killings occur annually. This figure reflects that Pakistan is still not safe for women.

Honor killings are a stain on the conscience of humanity. They are a barbaric practice that has no place in the 21<sup>st</sup> century (Malala Yousafzai)

The domestic violence is another cause which is rooted in patriarchal system and taking part in making women empowerment myths. This includes

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physical violence, sexual abuse, harassment and acid attacks. Over 90% of

Pakistani women have experienced some form of domestic violence in their

life time, according to a 2002 study by the Human Rights Commission of Pakistan (HRCP). Additionally, women

are not even safe under the custody of law enforcement agencies. A report published in 1992, ~~there are~~ according

to that, many incidence of custodian violence including sexual assault and rapes committed by policemen during police custody are reported. These domestic violence makes to believe that an women empowerment is myths.

In Pakistan, women face a lot of barriers to economic empowerment, resisting their full participation in workforces and

contributing to overall economic development of Pakistan. However, no country can progress without the full participation

of women in public life. According to Pakistan Bureau of statistics, there are only 22% of women who participate

in the workforce in Pakistan. The patriarchal norms and the traditional role of women are major factor

that restrict their entry in to job market. Moreover, Pakistan stands near bottom of women's participation in the

workforce. To conclude, the low



participation of women in economic sector shows a clear image that women empowerment is a myth in Pakistan.

Furthermore, the weak existing laws, which are meant for the protection of women's rights, faces challenges due to the gap between law on paper and implementation of laws on ground. The institutions which are responsible for enforcing laws related to women's rights often face the lack of resources, support and political will which causes justice delayed. Additionally, a large number of women in rural areas are unaware of their legal rights. Moreover, the patriarchal and cultural norms also play a role in undermining the effectiveness of laws which protect women. Hence, poor implementation gaps are making it difficult for women to get empowerment.

The legal discrimination against women is another obstacle to achieve the gender equality in Pakistan. Discriminatory laws, specially in family and violence matters often women do not get equally treated and to get justice. The unequal implementation of existing laws and enforcement causes

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bias in the legal system. However, women also face social stigma and threats from family, peer culture which prevent women from reporting cases of violence or pursuing of the legal actions. To conclude the legal discrimination against women and lack of equal treatment makes Pakistan harder for women to live empowered life.

Meanwhile, there is large population that believes women empowerment is reality in Pakistan. They point to women's participation in several aspects of life such as politics, businesses, and education. According to them women have equal rights, power and liberty as men have.
