

Write a comprehensive note on Zakat system of Islam and its spiritual, moral and social impacts.

Zakat

Zakat stands as a timeless and powerful practice in Islam. Its spiritual significance lies in its ability to purify wealth, promote empathy and obedience to God. At the same time, it carries a profound social impact, leading to reduction of class differences and alleviating financial hardship.

Meaning of Zakat:

The term Zakat is derived from the Arabic root "z-k-a" which means to "purify" or to "make pure". It is a form of almsgiving. It is mandatory for Muslims who meet certain criteria to give a portion of their wealth as Zakat to those in need. It is one of the five pillars in Islam and was made obligatory in 2 AH.

Difference between Zakat and Sadqah:

Zakat is obligatory whereas Sadqah is a voluntary form of charity.

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Importance of Zakat:

The act of giving Zakat purifies one's wealth and income. It reminds Muslims that their material possessions are blessings from Allah. By requiring those with excess wealth to give these a portion of it to those in need, it helps create a more equitable economic system.

Surah Hajj Verso 22:

"They are those who, if established in the land by Us, would perform prayer, pay alms-tax, encourage what is good, and forbid what is evil. And with Allah rests the outcome of all affairs."

Hadith Sahih Bukhari:

"Giving Zakat is more beloved to Allah than giving in charity during the entire year."

Conditions for Zakat:

Zakat is obligatory for people who are:

- Muslim
- Adult
- Sane
- Free: slaves are not obliged to pay Zakat.
- Financially capable: An individual should first ensure Gossip!

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that they have adequately provided for their family's needs, and should strive to be debt-free before paying Zakat.

Zakat cannot be given to:

- Descendants of the Prophet
- One's own spouse
- One's own parents and grandparents.
- One's own children and grandchildren.

Heads of Zakat:

- The Poor (Al-Fugara): Those who are destitute, unable to meet their basic needs, and are living in poverty
- The Needy (Al-Masakin): Those who may not be entirely destitute but are still in need of financial assistance to meet their basic needs.
- Those Who Collect Zakat: This refers to individuals who are responsible for collecting, distributing and administering Zakat funds.
- Reconciliation of Hearts: Zakat can be used to win hearts such of those who are converts to Islam. In earlier times, new converts were disowned by their families. Gossip!

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- Freeing Slaves (Fir-Riqab):
Zakat can be used to free slaves or captives.
- Those in Debt (Al-Gharimin):
Individuals who are in debt and unable to repay their debts can receive Zakat to help settle their financial obligations.
- In the Path of Allah (Fi Sabillah):
Zakat can be used for charitable causes in path of Allah, such as defense of Muslim community.
- Travelers (Ibn as-Sabil):
Travelers who are stranded or in need of financial assistance while on their journey can receive Zakat.

Impacts:

Spiritual Impacts:

Purification of Wealth: Giving Zakat is an act of purifying one's wealth. It helps believers rid themselves of the negative impacts of greed and materialism.

Hadith Sahih Bukhari:

“Zakat purifies one's wealth.”

Trust in Divine Provision:

Zakat encourages believers to part with a portion of their wealth, trusting that Allah will provide for their needs.

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Hadith Al-Tirmidhi:

"No wealth of a servant of Allah, is decreased because of charity."

Gratitude and Contentment:

Giving Zakat can help individuals develop gratitude for the blessings they have and promotes contentment with their own circumstances. This can lead to inner peace.

Obedience to God:

Zakat is a religious duty in Islam and fulfilling this obligation is considered an act of worship. By doing so, individuals demonstrate their obedience to God.

Hadith Sahih Muslim:

"Zakat is a form of worship and the one who fulfills it will be rewarded."

Social Impacts:

Reduction of Class Differences:

Hadith Sahih Bukhari:

"Zakat is a right that the poor have upon the rich"
