From the days of ancient Greece to modern times women have been fiercely competing in athletic. As in other fields of life, they are also facing inequalities in sport sector. Women's involvement in sports has evolved dramatically over the past century. In the late (early) **19th** century women were largely excluded from competitive sports due to social norms that deemed such activities inappropriate for females. The 1900 olympics marked

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turning point, allowing women to compete, albeit in limited events. As the decades progressed, female participation grew, culminating in the establishment of organizations like Women's Sports Foundation in **1974** which championed gender equity. Despite these advancements, the historical legacy of exclusion continues to impact the perception and recognition of women in sports today. Women's sport is facing systematic barriers that hinder their recognition and support as media coverage disparity, funding inequality, sponsorship challenges, limited promotions, lack of role models, historical neglect and cultural stereotypes. Addressing these barriers is crucial for advancing the recognition and support for women in sports by increasing media

coverage, enhancing funding, boosting sponsorship, making title IX more productive, increasing leadership, advocating for policy change, improving grassroots movements and initiatives as well. By implementing these strategies we can work towards a more equitable landscape for women's sports and enhance their support and recognition.

First comes media coverage disparities that is limiting women's recognition in sports. Media coverage plays an instrumental part in boosting women's sports to the forefront of public attention and is critical for dispelling the persistent inequality in athletics.

Research indicates that women's sports receive only 4% of media coverage, a stark contrast to men's sports which dominates the remaining 96%. (Women's Sports Foundation)

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2020). This lack of visibility translates into diminished visibility and engagement which are crucial for (wo) development of women's sports. For example the 2023 **FIFA** Women's World Cup attracted a record **1.5** billion viewers globally, yet the media coverage remained far less extensive than men's tournament, highlighting the stark inequities in attention given to women's events. So media is hindering recognition of women in sports.

Next comes economic disparities that are crucial barrier for women in sports. Female athletes frequently receive less funding as compared to their male counterparts. According to a report by Women's Sport Foundation, female athletes received only **37%** of overall athletic budgets which impacts recruitment, facilities and also scholarship availability. Moreover the

disparity in prize money such as the **\$30** million awarded in 2019 for Women's World Cup compared to **\$400** million for the men's tournament, underscores the systematic inequities that need to be addressed to foster more equitable environment. These economic disparities not only affect the current landscape of women's sports but also future growth and visibility.

The next comes sponsorship challenges faced by women's sports significantly hinder their recognition and growth. Many companies remain reluctant to invest in women's leagues and events often due to perception that they generate less audience interests compared to men's sports. This assumption is rooted in historical biases and a lack of media exposure. According to Institute of

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Diversity and Ethics in Sports (TIDES) report, about 0.4% of total sports sponsorship dollars allocated for women's sports. Additionally, a study by Women's Sports Foundation found that only **23%** of female athletes had sponsorship deals compared to 60% male athletes. These statistics underscore the need for increased investment and equitable opportunities in women's sports.

Then limited promotions of women's sports is a critical challenge that significantly undermines their recognition and growth. Promotional efforts for women's sports often lack the creative and strategic marketing seen in men's sports which further diminish their appeal. This result is a broader societal perception that women's sports are less exciting or significant which discourages both

viewership and participation. Women's World Cup have historically received less marketing attention than their male counterparts which affect overall fan interest and investment. Without adequate promotion, female athletes remain under-recognized and their achievements often go unnoticed, perpetuating a cycle of inequality in the sports industry.

Next comes lack of visible role models and leadership in women's sports significantly hinders their struggle for recognition. Many young female athletes look up to figures who can inspire and guide them but the scarcity of prominent female leaders in sports create a gap of in representation. With fewer female coaches, administrators, and media figures, there are limited opportunities for mentorship which can

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discourage young girls from pursuing sports. Additionally the absence of female leader in decision-making roles often results in policies and practices that don't prioritize the growth of female athletes. This combination of underrepresentation and lack of support perpetuates a cycle where female athletes struggle to gain recognition and equal opportunities ultimately affect the overall women's sports.

Then historical neglect had deeply impacted the recognition and development of women's sports creating a legacy of inequality that persists today. For much of history, women athletes were marginalized receiving minimal support or investment compared to the male athletes. This neglect has roots in societal attitude that has

traditionally viewed women as less capable or deserving of opportunities in athletics. As a result, women's sports have often been relegated to secondary status with fewer resources allocated for development, training and competition. This historical oversight has led to a lack of visibility to female athletes who struggle to gain the same recognition as their male counterparts. The legacy of neglect not only affects the current landscape but also shapes the aspirations of future generations.

Lastly, cultural stereotypes significantly hinder the recognition and advancement of women's sports perpetuating biases that deem female athletes as less competitive or entertaining than their male counterparts. These stereotypes often manifest in media coverage where women's

sports are portrayed through a lens focused on personal narrative rather than athletic achievements. In the similar way feudalism also incubates the hinderance in recognition of women's sports as compared to men. The patriarchal society take it ashamefull to contribution of women in sports. So all theses stereotypes and our traditional cultures hinders the women's recognition and development in sports.

The essay has shed the light on these factors that are hinderance in the recognition and support of women's sports.

Now are some strategies by implementing them the female athletes can be prioritized and can make recognition in the sport sector like male athletes.

Firstly media coverage must be increased. To address the barriers faced by women's sports in gaining recognition, increasing media coverage is essential. Media plays a crucial role in shaping public perception and interest in sports. By dedicating more airtime and resources to women's events, networks can elevate the visibility of female athletes and competitions. This includes broadcasting more games, highlighting key achievements and ~~providing~~ providing in-depth analysis of women's sports. Additionally, creating dedicated segments or programs focused on women's athletics can foster a deeper understanding and appreciation among audiences. Moreover, encouraging media outlets to cover women's sports with the same enthusiasm and professionalism as men's sports will

help to increase the recognition and development of female athletics.

Secondly, advocating for equal funding also enhance women's athletics. Advocating for equal funding is a critical step towards breaking down barriers to recognition. Financial investment is essential for the development of talent, infrastructure and overall competitiveness. Sports organizations, governing bodies and sponsors must commit to allocating resources equitably between men's and women's sports.

This involve not only direct funding for women's team but also ensuring that women have access to the same equality of training facilities, coaching and equipment as their male counterparts. Engaging stakeholders such as fans, athletes and sponsors in conversations about the importance of

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investing in women's sports can help shift perceptions and foster a culture of sports. By equal funding we can build a more balanced and fair sports ecosystem that nurtures the growth of female athletes and enhance their visibility.

Thirdly boosting sponsorship opportunities women's sports recognition can be enhanced. Boosting sponsorship opportunities for women's sports is essential to enhancing their visibility and overall recognition. Corporations and brand need to recognize the significant untapped potential within women's athletics and invest in these markets. This requires a shift in mindset moving away from the outdated belief that women's sports lack audience appeal. Companies can initiate partnership that not only provide financial backing but also engage

in co-marketing strategies that highlight female athletes and their achievements. For example creating campaign around major women's sporting events can draw attention and build interest. Additionally organizing sponsorship tiers can create a sustainable funding ecosystem. Engaging existing sponsors of men's sports to expand their portfolios to include women's events can also help bridge the funding gaps. Ultimately boosting sponsorship opportunities will provide the necessary resources for female athletes to excel, improving performance and recognition in the broader sports landscape.

Fourthly comes the title IX that can enhance woman's recognition in sports. Title IX enacted in 1972 was a landmark legislation aimed at prohibiting gender discrimination in

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educational institution. This law significantly transformed women's sports leading to a dramatic increase in participation rates at both higher schools and colleges. Prior to Title IX fewer than 300,000 girls participated in high school sports, today the number exceeds 3 million. Title IX has been instrumental in creating opportunities for female athletes yet challenges remain including enforcement issues. By proper enforcement of Title IX, recognition and development of women's sports can observe fruitful changes.

Then comes female athletes as a role model to advocate gender equality and recognition in sports. Prominent figures like Billie Jean King and Serena Williams have utilized their platforms to address issues such as pay equity and media representation.

Their activism has inspired younger generations to pursue their athletic dreams while pursuing the systematic change, notably the US Women's National Soccer Team's legal battle for equal pay has generated widespread attention, highlighting the ongoing struggle for fairness and women's recognition in sports.

Next comes advocating policy change that is crucial for addressing the systematic barrier that women's sports face in achieving the recognition. This advocacy can take many forms from pushing the equitable funding and resource to sport sector and educational institutions to advocating for policy reform at national and international levels that prioritize women's sports. Engaging with lawmakers and sports governing bodies to ensure that women's

sports receive equal treatment. Lastly organizations and initiatives have emerged to support women in sports for greater recognition.
