Difference between Deen and Religion : Importance of Deen in human life:

Introduction:

Islam is not only a religion but also a Deen, which means a complete code of life. Religion deals man's relation with Allah (swt) whereas Deen deals both with man's relation with Allah (swt) and his fellow beings.

In other words, Deen is an all embracing term which includes religio-socio-political-economic system. It touches upon the

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material as well as spiritual dimensions of human existence. Following is the detailed discussion of difference between Deen and Religion, and importance of Deen in human life.

Difference between Deen

and Religion:

(2) Deen is a system of life where Almighty Allah (swt) is worshipped and obeyed, not just in a narrow religious sense, but in a manner that includes all aspects of life.

(2) Religion is commonly used in a narrow sense, its scope is limited to a set of dogmas, some rituals for worship, and a number of social customs to celebrate important life events.

(3) Deen is same
for everyone (muslims).


(8) The centre of Islam as a Deen is human being.

(10) Fig: Deen covers entire life






Fig: Religion deals with individual life only.

Importance of Deen in human life:-

(1) Moral and Ethical framework:

Deen provides a moral and ethical framework that helps individuals distinguish between right and wrong.

This guidance is based on the Quran and Sunnah, which outline a

clear code of conduct for Muslims.

For example, the Quran states;

"Indeed Allah commands justice, the doing of good, and liberality to kin and kith. He forbids all shameful deeds, injustice, and rebellion."

(16:90)

This verse highlights how Deen encourages justice, kindness, and fairness, while prohibiting immoral behaviour, ensuring that individuals lead a righteous life.

(2) Fostering Spiritual Fulfillment and Inner Peace :-

Deen minimizes the spiritual aspect

of life by promoting a deep connection with Allah through acts

of worship such as prayer (Salah).

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fasting (Sawm), and Supplication (Dua), Muslims experience spiritual fulfillment and inner peace. The Quran mentions;

الْأَيَّلُونَ إِذَا ذَكَرُوا رَبَّهُمْ لَظُفَرُوا مِنَ الْغُلُوبِ

Translation:

"Surely, in the remembrance of Allah do hearts find comfort."

(Ar-Ra'd, 13:28)

This verse indicates that the remembrance of Allah provides comfort and tranquility, demonstrating how Deen contributes to mental and emotional well-being.

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(4) Deen promotes establishment of Justice and Equality:-

Deen promotes justice and equality, which are vital for societal harmony.

The Quran instructs believers;

"O you who have believed,
be persistently standing
firm in justice, witnesses

to what is right even if it be
against yourselves or

parents and relatives." An-Nisa

(4:135)

(5) Accountability and Preparation for the Hereafter:-

Deen prepares individuals for accountability in the Hereafter, emphasizing the transient nature of worldly life.

The Quran reminds us;

“And this worldly life
is not but diversion and
amusement. And indeed,
the home of the Hereafter
that is the eternal life.”
“only they knew.”

(Al-Ankabut, 29:64)

The Prophet Muhammad (SAW) further reinforced by saying;

“The world is prison for the
believer and a paradise
for the non-believer.”

(Sahih Muslim)

(6) Balance and Moderation in Life:

Islam encourages a balanced and moderate approach to life, which is essential for physical and spiritual

well-being. The Quran advises;

وَلَا يَأْشِبُوا وَلَا تُسْرِفُوا إِنَّهُ لَا يُحِبُ الْمُسْرِفِينَ

Translation:

"And eat and drink, but be not excessive. Indeed, He likes not those who commit

excess."

(Al-A'raf, 7:31)

This principle helps maintain overall health and prevent excesses that can lead to harm.

(7) Promotion of Community

and Brotherhood:

Deen fosters a strong sense of community and brotherhood among Muslims, promoting unity and mutual support. The Quran declares;

"The believers are but

brothers, so make settlement

between your brothers.

And fear Allah that

you may receive
mercy."'

"يَا أَيُّهَا الْمُتَّقِينَ (Al-Hijr, 49:10)

The Prophet Muhammad (SAW) also likened the Muslim community to a single body, emphasizing solidarity;

"وَالْبَرِّ إِيمَانُهُمْ بَلَى
The believers in their mutual
love, mercy, and compassion,
are like one body; if one
part - feels pain, the whole
body responds with wakefulness
and fever."

(Sahih Muslim)

(8) Encouragement of knowledge and Intellectual growth:

Deen encourages pursuit of knowledge
and intellectual growth, which is vital

for personal development and societal development / advancement. The first revelation of the Quran begins with the command to read,

اقرء بِاسْمِ رَبِّكَ الَّذِي خَلَقَ

Translation:

"Read, 'O Prophet', in the Name of your Lord Who created."

(Al-'Alaq, 96:1)

Moreover, the Prophet Muhammad (SAW) stated;

"Seeking knowledge is an obligation upon every Muslim."

(Ibn-Majah)

This highlights the importance of continuous learning.

(9) Personal Development and Self-discipline:

Deen guides individuals towards

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personal development and self discipline, promoting virtues like patience, gratitude, and self-control. The Quran states,

“But those who believe and do righteous deeds - We will admit them to gardens beneath which rivers flow, wherein they abide forever. It is the promise of Allah, (which is) truth, and who is more truthful than Allah in statement.”

(An-Nisa, 4:122)

This verse underscores the importance of righteous living and personal growth for eternal success.

(10) Purpose of creation: Worship of Allah:

Deen provides primary purpose of life, which is to worship and serve Allah.

The Quran states;

"And I did not create the jinn and mankind except to worship Me." ¹¹

(Adh-Dhariyat, 51:56)

This verse highlights the ultimate object of mankind existence is worship, and Deen outlines the framework for this worship through various acts of devotion and ethical living.

(11) Guidance from Darkness to Light:

Deen acts as a comprehensive guide that leads believers from the darkness of ignorance to the light of knowledge and truth. The Quran states;

"Allah is the ally of those who believe. He brings them out from

into the light.”

(Al-Baqarah, 2:251)

This guidance is essential for navigating life's challenges and making morally sound decisions.

(12) Encouragement of Repentance and Forgiveness:

Deen emphasizes the importance of repentance and seeking forgiveness for one's sins, recognizing human imperfection.

The Quran says;

“And those who, when they commit an immorality or wrong against themselves (by transgression), remember Allah and seek forgiveness for their sins—and who can forgive sins except Allah—and (who) do not persist in what they have done while they know.”

(Al-Imran, 3:135)

Conclusion:-

Therefore, Deen is a complete code of life, whereas religion is a way of life that can vary person to person. Moreover, Deen is integral to human life as it provides purpose, guidance, peace, morality, justice, community, knowledge, personal growth, protection from evil, and encouragement of repentance. By adhering to the teachings of Islam, individuals can lead fulfilling lives that are not only pleasing to Allah but also beneficial themselves and society as a whole.

As Quran states;

الَّذِينَ يَرْجِعُونَ إِلَيْهِ الْأَسْمَاءُ

Translation:

"Certainly, Allah's only way is Islam"

(Al-Imran, 3:19)
