Editorial (1): Whither Amendment

A much-hyped constitutional amendment, which was set to rewrite the terms of judicial engagement, could not see the light of the day apparently owing to a lack of desired strength on the floor of the house. The mysterious draft remained shrouded in secrecy مائنوى after a high-drama of being in session till the wee hours of Monday. It is for the first time that even members of the ruling clique مائنون did not know of the specifics of the bill, conveying a weird impression that extra-parliamentary forces are pulling the strings. It was irritating پریشان کن for both the treasury and the opposition to keep their fingers crossed in the absence of a formal draft, and the governmental persuasion to win over the JUI-F and BNP-Mengal rested on assumptions of the proposed legislation.

While the government is still hopeful to go ahead with the stunt it had created of its own, critics see little potential in it. The JUI-F thoroughly remained in the spotlight as its demands to the core and refused to give in for reasons best جال جلى known to it. The PTI too put up a good show of defiance but was seen wandering in the dark as many of its legislators went astray عمراه and were not in the roll call. The proposed amendment has dented the parliamentary credentials of the ruling coalition, and exposed their alleged intentions of clipping تراشنا the feathers of the judiciary. Likewise, the thrust to route the appointment of superior judiciary through the legislature and executive would be seen as conflict of interest, along with undesired extension in service tenure of the sitting chief justice.

Editorial (2): HIV Alarm

Pakistan is **grappling with** an alarming escalation in HIV cases. The country is experiencing the second fastest rate of HIV increase in the Asia-Pacific region, largely due to the spread of the virus from key populations to the general population through sexual networks. The epidemic is primarily affecting key populations such as people who inject drugs (PWID), male and female sex workers and transgender individuals. HIV is spread through specific bodily fluids and gradually weakens the immune system,

reducing the body's ability to fight infections. Without treatment, it can advance to AIDS, a stage where the immune system is severely مسختى سے compromised, making even minor illnesses potentially life-threatening. Recent reports highlight the severity of our fight against this public health crisis, especially in the light of global advancements in managing and reducing HIV transmission. A small percentage of those diagnosed تشخیص are receiving the essential antiretroviral therapy, leaving the majority vulnerable to further spread of the virus.

Grappling with: Phrasal Verb; Struggling to deal with or overcome a challenging situation.

Another significant factor in the spread of the disease is the extensive use of contaminated الوده medical equipment by healthcare providers. In Pakistan, there is a dire need to change society's attitude towards the disease. People often avoid getting tested for HIV because of the stigma associated with the disease, which can lead to judgment from relatives and even healthcare professionals. It is essential to understand that the battle against HIV involves more than just the health sector. Addressing the HIV issue requires a societal shift to challenge misconceptions, غلط فهميال fight discrimination and create a supportive environment. Essential components include mental health support, strict infection control in healthcare settings and inclusive policies for marginalised communities. India, with a population base of over a billion, has largely been successfully combating the epidemic over the past two decades. There is no reason why authorities in Pakistan cannot do so either.

Editorial (3): Hockey Humiliation

Pakistan hockey, once a global powerhouse that competed with the best teams in the world, now finds itself humbled on the regional stage. In what can only be described as a humiliating نفن defeat, Pakistan fell in the semi-final of the Asian Hockey Champions Trophy. China, a team with far less history and experience in the sport, knocked Pakistan out of the tournament in a dramatic penalty shootout. For a country that once dominated غلبه the world stage, winning Olympic gold and World Cup titles, this loss to a relatively inexperienced Chinese side is a painful reminder of how far Pakistan hockey has fallen.

Now, Pakistan is struggling to even maintain a foothold in Asia. Despite managing a 5-1 win over China earlier in the tournament, the national team could not capitalise on their opportunities when it mattered سما most. Missing four consecutive penalties in the shootout, Pakistan handed China a 2-0 victory - a defeat that speaks volumes about the state of the game in the country.
