Therefore, fair and free elections form the back bone of democratic governance, ensuring transparency and accountability.

Likewise, decentralization of power is a fundamental feature of democratic governance. It ensures that authority is distributed among various levels of government rather than concentrated in a single central body. With power shared among national, regional, and local institutions, governance becomes more responsive to the unique needs of each community. For instance, Germany's robust federal system enables its states to craft policies that reflect regional realities, thereby enriching the democratic process through greater inclusivity and tailored governance. Similarly, political liberty and freedom form the cornerstone of a truly democratic

Hence, it is proven political liberty and freedom are vital to democracy, as they ensure that governance remains a genuine reflection of the people's diverse voices and aspirations.

The above given discussion highlights the key features of true democracy. Although every nation may enshrine key democratic features such as decentralization, fair elections, and political liberty, these ideals truly flourish only when the populace is literate. In societies where illiteracy prevails, these democratic structures become vulnerable to manipulation and populist rhetoric. The analysis below is going to illustrate how democracy is the worst form when the public is illiterate.

The first factor undermining democratic governance is vulnerability to manipulation. This term describes the susceptibility of an electorate, especially one lacking proper education and critical thinking skills, to be swayed by misleading information, sensational rhetoric, and deliberate propaganda. When citizens are unable to discern reliable information from false narratives, they become easy targets for those who seek to exploit their ignorance for

political gain. For example, during the 2016 U.S. presidential election, studies revealed that nearly 126 million Americans were exposed to manipulative content on social media, a figure that underscores how manipulation of uneducated masses can distort the public opinion and erode the integrity of democratic processes. To sum it up, vulnerability to manipulation is indeed a critical factor that undermines the very foundations of democratic governance.

Secondly, weak accountability and corruption make the situation worse for democracy. Weak accountability is the inability of institutions to hold public officials accountable for their actions, while corruption involves the misuse of power for personal gain. In Afghanistan, these issues are deeply entrenched and have critically undermined efforts to build a stable democratic system. As a result, Afghanistan's democratic framework has faltered, with institutions covered with the cycle of corruption and poor accountability, failing to function properly, jeopardizing the long-term stability and legitimacy of Afghanistan's democratic system. In short, weak accountability and corruption significantly worsen democratic governance, as they create an environment where power is abused and the public mandate is betrayed.

Thirdly, the selection of incompetent leaders further undermines democracy. Ignorant people swayed by populist rhetoric and superficial

promises, often choose leaders who lack the necessary skills and integrity to govern effectively. An uninformed vote is as dangerous as no vote at all, as it paves the way for disastrous outcomes. In Haiti, high illiteracy rates have led to the election of ineffective leaders, worsening political and economic crisis. Without the ability to critically assess candidates and their platforms, the electorate is easily misled by charismatic figures who offer superficial solutions to ~~substantive~~ without substantive policies or clear plans. Therefore, the selection of incompetent leaders, driven by an ill-informed electorate, poses a serious threat to the integrity and future of democratic governance.

Fourth, political instability and social unrest pose significant challenges to democratic governance, particularly when the electorate lacks the education needed to discern complex political dynamics. Political instability refers to the erratic shifts in government power, often through coups or violent upheavals, while social unrest encompasses the widespread protests and disturbances that erupt from deep seated dissatisfaction. For example, in Sudan, uneducated masses have been exploited as political pawns, fueling frequent coups and uprisings. Therefore, political instability and social unrest severely compromise democracy, transforming civic participation from a force for progress into a catalyst for disruption and chaos.

The fifth factor responsible for making democratic governance worse is dynastic and identity politics. Dynastic politics refers to the concentration of political power within a single family or clan, while identity politics involves voters supporting candidates based on shared cultural, ethnic, or religious identities rather than on competence or policy merit. Both phenomena undermine democratic ideals by prioritizing loyalty and heritage over merit-based leadership. For instance, the enduring influence of political dynasties such as the Marcos family in Philippines illustrates how inherited power can persist despite questionable governance, leading to policies that often serve personal interests rather than common good. Therefore, the rise of dynastic and identity politics significantly distorts the democratic governance, hindering true representation and progressive change.

Moreover, electoral fraud plays its part in tarnishing the fair name of democratic dispensation. It refers to the manipulation of the voting process through illegal means such as vote rigging, buying and falsification of results. In many cases, this malpractice goes undetected, particularly among illiterate voters who lack the awareness or resources to scrutinize the process. For example, in Nigeria, a method known as the "stomach infrastructure" technique is used, where politicians distribute food and cash to

secure votes, thereby undermining the integrity of the election. Consequently, electoral fraud not only distorts the democratic mandate but also erodes public trust, further weakening the foundations of democratic governance.

Lastly, politics of interest is another pernicious factor that undermines true democracy. This term refers to a system where decisions are made to benefit a small, self-serving group rather than the collective good. In such environments, policies are crafted not for public welfare but to advance the interests of the powerful elite, often manipulating state resources and political power for personal gain. For example, in Venezuela, the ruling elite has frequently exploited state mechanisms to distribute resources selectively, thereby securing loyalty among the masses while marginalizing the broader public needs. This practice not only distorts democratic governance but also deepens public disillusionment and erodes trust in government institutions. Therefore, politics of interest, especially in societies with an illiterate electorate, decisively undermines the foundation of genuine democratic governance.

Following this brief review of the factors that make democracy a flawed system of government, the next section will offer

recommendations for addressing illiteracy and strengthening the democratic process, so that a true democracy could be brought for the welfare ~~for the~~ of the public.
