

Qs. Evaluate the effectiveness of various diplomatic initiatives and peace proposals aimed at resolving the Israel - Hamas conflict?

i) Introduction:

The Israel-Hamas conflict began in 1987 with the founding of Hamas during the first Intifada. As an Islamist militant group, Hamas rejects Israel's right to exist and seeks to liberate Palestinian territories. The conflict is asymmetric, which with Israel's advanced military facing a non-state actor using guerrilla tactics. Ideological and territorial disputes - especially Gaza, the West Bank and East Jerusalem - fuel ongoing violence. Despite multiple diplomatic efforts, a sustainable resolution remains elusive due to recurring violence, deep-rooted mistrust, and lack of mutual recognition.

II Background of the Israel-Hamas Conflict :-

Hamas emerged during the first Intifada in 1987 as an offshoot of the Muslim Brotherhood, combining Islamist ideology with Palestinian nationalism. It is also rejecting Israel's legitimacy. In 2006, winning the 2006 elections, Hamas took control of Gaza by force, and leading to a blockade by Israel. Since then, the region has witnessed repeated cycles of conflict - mostly (2008-09, 2012, 2014 and 2023-24). These confrontations have involved rocket fire, Israel airstrikes, and high civilian casualties. Overall, setting the entrenched nature of the conflict.

III Major Diplomatic Initiatives Aimed at Israel - Hamas Conflict

i) Egyptain - Brokered Ceasefires:-

Egypt has played a key role mediating role in major conflicts between Israel and Hamas, notably (2008, 2012, 2014 and 2023). These truces often lack enforcement and mainly aim to enable short-term humanitarian relief.

ii) UN-led Humanitarian and Diplomatic Engagement:-

UN-Special Coordinator's efforts in conflict between Israel and Hamas likely (2014 Gaza Reconstruction mechanism). The UN focus to the reconstruction, de-escalation and humanitarian access after the engagement of one platform of both Israel and Hamas.

iii) US and Qatari ceasefire mediation (2023 - 24):-

Mediator is continuously making mediation between Israel-Hamas conflict.

The U.S - Qatar makes ceasefire mediation b/w between Israel - Hamas through backchannel negotiations during recent escalation. They focus on hostage release, temporary ceasefires and aid corridors.

iv) Indirect - Israel - Hamas Negotiations via Third Parties.

Intermediaries like the UN, Egypt, Turkey and Qatar have facilitated indirect communication between Israel and Hamas. Due to deep ideological opposition, there are no formal talks or mutual recognition.

III Evaluation of the Effectiveness of These Initiatives.

(i) Temporary De-escalation Achieved:

Ceasefires have stopped immediate violence and prevented prolonged wars. The negotiations allowed humanitarian

aid and reconstruction access during
Short - period of calm.

ii) Core factor of No resolution:

The core factors of conflict
(blockades recognition, demilitarization,
territorial control) remain unresolved.
The diplomatic efforts focus on
symptom management, not root
cause between Israel - Hamas conflict.

iii) Repeated Ceasefire Collapses:

Short-lived truces due to
absence of enforcement mechanisms.

Ceasefire in May 2021, lasted only
11 days before hostilities resumed.

The Israel - Hamas did not have
on it, that reason mediation or ceasefire
Short periods of time.

iv) Humanitarian Focus vs Political Settlements.

Diplomatic efforts focus on

humanitarian access until not political compromise. Diplomatic efforts often prioritize short-term of the humanitarian needs. They established lack of a durable peace framework, sustaining a cycle of instability.

i) Inclusive diplomacy:-
