

The Politics of Compromise and Pakistan's Political Parties

Pakistan's history is full of many compromises that costed democracy; the current Hybrid regime is the biggest compromise. Parties in power are merely the face of the actual ~~st~~ rulers: establishment and bureaucracy. Expecting a reform in this compromised setup of democracy is a mistake one can make. People of Pakistan's only hope lies in the realm of political parties, which are currently in disarray.

Pakistan Muslim League Non (PMLN) has a formidable legacy; it returns to power every other time. Behind its success lies ~~that~~ strategy of maintaining good relationship with country's elite and voters' happiness. It is achieved through economic reforms and schemes. In past, these development schemes were carried out by getting huge loans from every possible lender. On the contrary, present setup is unable to ~~lend~~ borrow that amount of money; therefore, PMLN tries to appease their workers through their government in Punjab.
