In the modern information age, the greatest weapon is not a missile or a gun, but a false narrative. Fake news and propaganda have emerged as the most dangerous threats of the current era, capable of shaping perceptions, manipulating decisions and destabilizing entire nations. With the rapid expansion of social media and digital communication, falsehood travels faster than truth,

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reaching millions within seconds. Unlike traditional threats such as poverty, terrorism, or climate change, fake news and propaganda strike directly at the foundation of societies - trust, credibility and informed decision-making. If left unchecked, they have potential to destabilize governance, disrupt economies, and endanger global peace. Hence, it can rightly be said that fake news and propaganda constitute the biggest threat of the current age.

However, one of the most damaging effects of fake news is the erosion of public trust in institutions, media, and even governments. When people are constantly bombarded with conflicting information, they lose the ability to distinguish truth from falsehood. This phenomenon is often described as the "post truth era", where facts become secondary

to emotions and beliefs. For instance, in the United States, false claims about the 2020 presidential election led to widespread distrust in the capital Hill riots. Similarly, in Pakistan, fake news about election rigging or corruption often fuels political instability and weakens public faith in democracy. Such erosion of trust undermines the very foundation upon which stable societies are built.

Moreover, Democracy thrives on an informed citizenry, but fake news and propaganda corrupt the flow of accurate information. Political actors and pressure groups use disinformation campaigns to manipulate public opinion and gain power.

A notable example is the "Cambridge Analytical scandal," where personal data from Facebook was misused to influence voter behaviour during the 2016 U.S. elections and

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the Brexit referendum. In developing countries, propaganda is often used to suppress dissent, silence opposition, and create manipulated version of reality. Such practices not only weaken democratic institutions but also pave the way of authoritarianism.

Adding, Fake news and propaganda play a critical role in dividing societies along religious, ethnic, or ideologic lines. By spreading hate speeches and stereotypes, they fuel polarization and violence. For instance, in india spread of false information on WhatsApp has triggered mob lynchings based on rumors of child kidnapping or cow slaughter. Similarly, in Myanmar, online propaganda contributed to violence against the Rohingya muslim community, resulting in a humanitarian crisis. These examples illustrate how false

narratives can incite hatred, disrupt social harmony, and lead to human rights violations.

Therefore, Fake news not only threaten politics and society, it also carries severe economic and health consequences. Economically, the spread of misinformation about financial markets, companies or product can cause massive losses. For instance, in 2013, a false tweet claiming that the white house had been attacked wiped out 136 bn dollars from US stock market within minutes before the rumor was corrected. In health sector, has been even more deadly. During COVID-19 pandemic, millions were misled by false claims that drinking bleach or consuming certain herbs could cure the virus. This misinformation not only endangered lives but also undermined global vaccination campaigns, as anti-vaccine

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propaganda / spread fear and mistrust.
