How does Montesquieu classify government?
What form he considers to be the best?

ANSWER

INTRODUCTION

Montesquieu was one of the great political philosophers of the English Enlightenment. He constructed a naturalistic account of the various forms of government, and of the causes that made them what they were and that advanced or constrained their development. He used this account to explain how government might be preserved from corruption. He saw despotism as a standing danger for any government not already despotic and argued that it could best be prevented by a system in which different bodies exercised legislative, executive and judicial powers and in which all these bodies were bound by rule of law.

FORMS OF GOVERNMENT - CONSTITUTIONAL

THEORY

Montesquieu has classified forms of government in his magnum opus *The Spirit of the Laws*. He argues that there are different ways in which government can be organized. This diversity arises from the fact that human needs vary according to the circumstances. The form taken by the government and its constitutional structure will depend upon various variables: climate conditions, geopolitical location, occupational status, religion and culture etc.

Montesquieu divides government into three kinds

- Despotism
- Monarchies
- Republics (Democratic Republics and Aristocratic Republics)

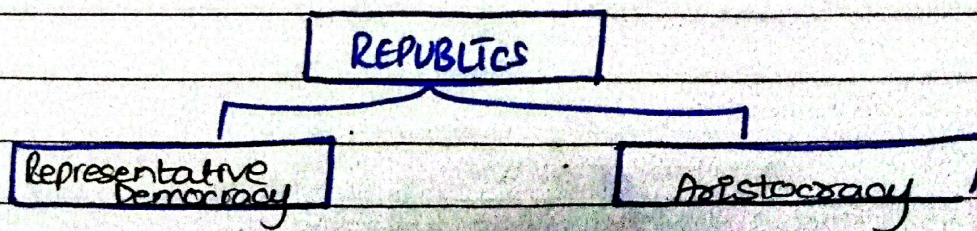
Each type of government has two components: Nature and Principle.

Nature: Defined by where the sovereign power lies
Principle: It is that spring or motor to motivate the behaviour or the part of the citizens in ways that will tend to support the regime and make it function smoothly and successfully.

1. REPUBLIC

In Republics, sovereignty belongs to the people and these are free governments headed by popularly elected people - Republican political system vary depending on how broadly they extend citizenship rights. Those that extend relatively broadly citizenship rights are termed democratic republics, while those that restrict citizenship more narrowly are termed aristocratic republics.

Republics can be subdivided into two.



i- REPRESENTATIVE DEMOCRACY

Nature: The will of people of all sorts - people elect their officials.

Principle: The willingness to put community interest ahead of private interest.

Power belongs to the people as a whole and their elected representatives in representative democracy - In democracy there can be no exercise of sovereignty but by the votes of the people and these votes express their own will. They may govern through ministers, or be advised by a senate, but they must have the power of choosing their ministers and senators for themselves.

ii- ARISTOCRACY

He differs from Aristotle on the definition of Aristocracy which the latter classified as government by superior individuals endowed with natural merit giving them the right to exercise power.

Nature: It is an assembly of noblemen regulating the affairs of the state.

Principle: The kind of Republic only thrives on the principle of moderation, to restrain themselves both from oppressing the people and from trying to acquire excessive powers over one another - harmony and order within the ruling class.

The major difficulty in aristocratic republics is not restraining the populace but rather controlling the power of the nobles because those are to execute the laws against their own colleagues will immediately perceive that they are in essence acting against themselves.

2- MONARCHY

A system of government in which a single person - usually a king or queen rules as the head of state, often for life and by hereditary rights.

Nature: A single person governs by fixed and established laws. The power of the Monarch is tempered by the countervailing influences of the parliament,

nobility and the clergy.

Principle: The love of Honor, since it gives people something to aspire to, whether it's their personal sense of self-worth, or their desire to serve their king. It is not unnatural as was the case in republics; it is natural in this sense that to win honor and distinction comes naturally to us.

3. DESPOTIC GOVERNMENT

A form of government where a single ruler holds absolute, unchecked power and governs in an oppressive or tyrannical manner.

Nature: A single person directs everything by his own will.

Principle: The fear of ruler - the servility of subjects. The ruler maintains control by keeping people afraid through absolute and oppressive power.

BEST FORM OF GOVERNMENT ACCORDING

TO MONTESQUIEU

According to Montesquieu the Representative Democracy is the best form of government because it protects political liberty by ensuring that power is not concentrated in the hands of any single person or group. In representative democracy people choose their rulers, which prevents the rise of tyranny.
