Masculinity:

iv) Accepting:

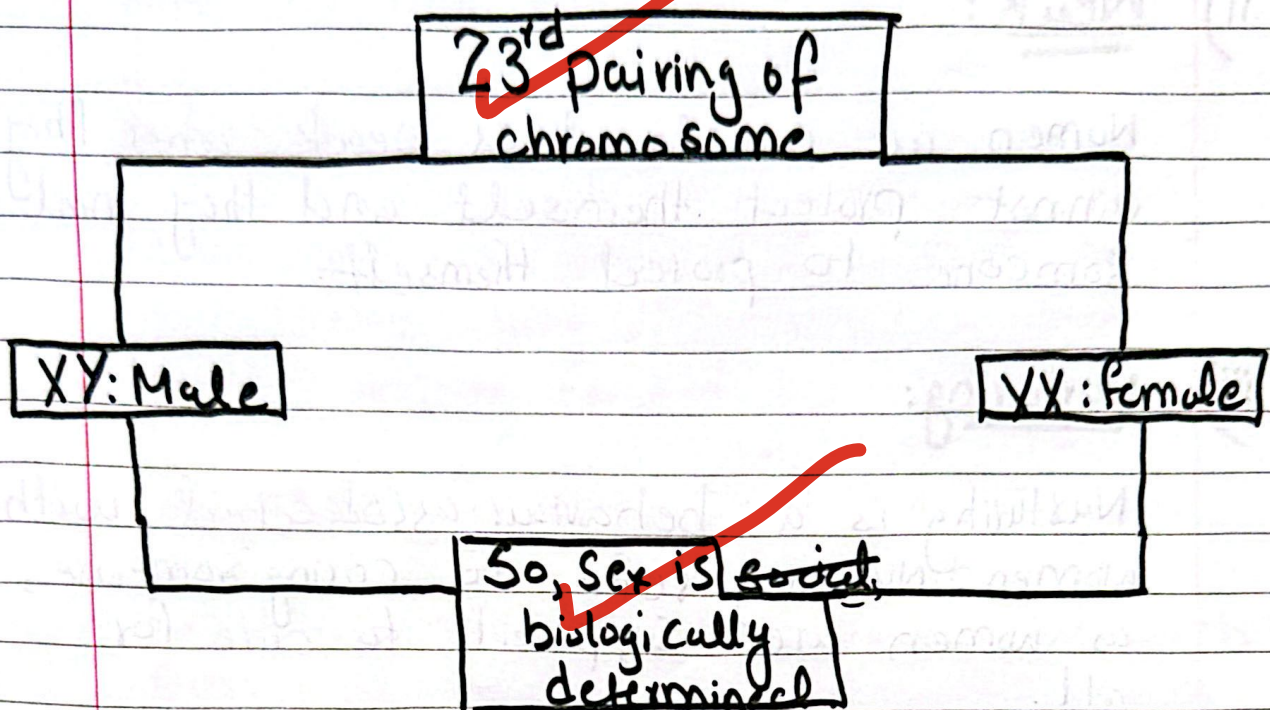
Women should accept any situation, is another societal perspective. Women are supposed to accept any torture, as this is in their nature.

determined that pairing of chromosome results in different genders. The diagram is illustrated below.

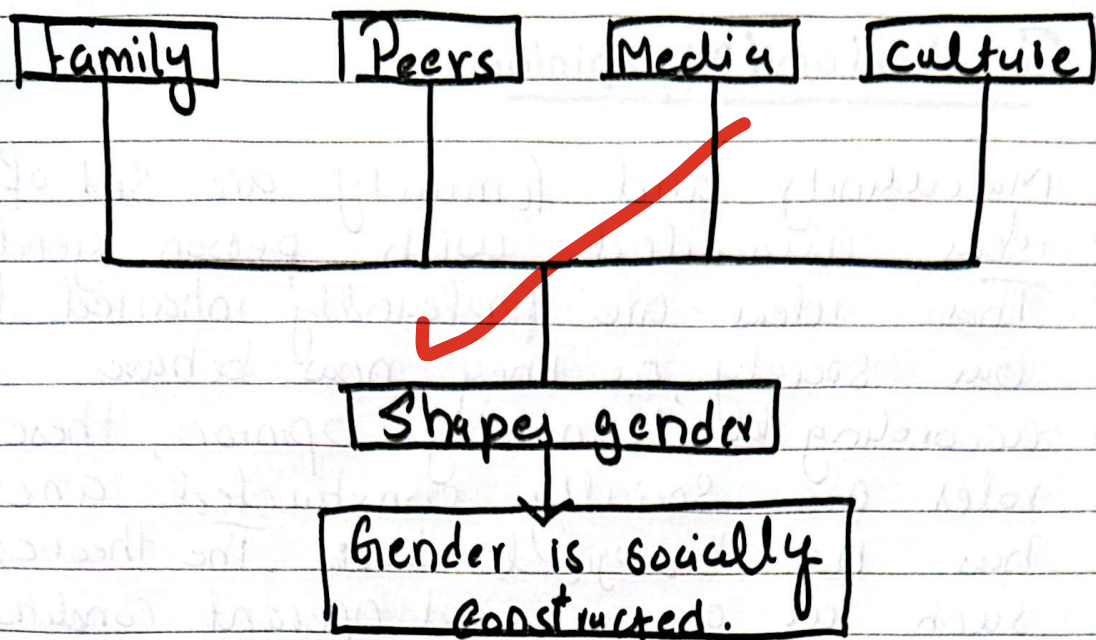


Theories against gender roles:

i) Queer theory:

ii) Operant conditioning theory:

Operant conditioning theory asserts that gender is socially constructed. The theory interprets that behaviour is learned by its outcome or reward.
