In 2025, ~~the~~ Iceland, Norway, Finland ranked among the top most countries on the Global Gender Gap report. This report considers four main domains such as women literacy (education), access to health care (health), opportunities (economic) and political representation. ~~Thus,~~ this shows that Nordic countries not only have equality in equality in education, but every aspect of country's affairs. Thus, these countries ~~are~~ the perfect example that education can achieve gender equality.

The most strong political leader, Quaid-e-Azam Muhammad Ali Jinnah once said regarding women participation that, "A Nation cannot achieve its glory without women support".

This quotation illustrates that women's equal participation can change the fate of a nation. One most brilliant example in this regard is "Rwanda". Rwanda has gone through catastrophic event known as "Rwanda Genocide". The

post-genocide situation was immense destructive. Now, it ranks on the top most prosper countries in African continent. In terms of gender equality, Women hold more than 60% of representation in the parliament of Rwanda. Along with this, it has literacy rate over 70% with minimum gender disparity. In the South Asian countries, Middle Eastern and African countries the gender disparity is prevalent despite the education. These countries have more than 50% literacy rate but still they lack gender equality. Even the representation is not as per their population. For instance, in Pakistan where female population is 49%, but their representation in political, legal and economic domains is less than 20%. Afghanistan, Iran, India, Nigeria, Sudan, Syria, and Yemen etc are also undergoing the same gender biasness.

The practices like harassment is so common even in the countries where education literacy rate is also adequate. In this regard, India is one of the example. India has literacy rate more than 70% but in terms of harassment, this country is considered unsafe for a

women. Many travel vloggers have faced harassment which were recorded on live streaming. Similarly, Iran has 98% literacy rate but there women deprive of their fundamental rights.

The certain established stereotypes that limits the gender equality in many societies. For instance, women is considered as a caregiver. Another example is ^{that} ~~women~~ ^{is} education opportunity is provided to women to get a good spouse and better in-laws after marriage. As per the statistics, 15% - 20% of women do not pursue their medical practice after completing their degree. In Pakistan The above facts are ~~not~~ prevalent in the developing countries. This reflects the social barriers which confine the women as an an caregiver and domestic individual.

Women faces pay-gap discrimination. They do not get paid equally despite giving equal work-part and time. As stated in the Gender Gap Report 2025 by World Economic Forum, it shows that women earn

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only 77% of the men's income annually. In the agriculture sector, the majority of the workforce is ~~based on~~ ~~it~~ comprises of women.

Thus, the gender ~~inequality~~ cannot be achieved through education. Other developments are also necessary to end the gap based on gender identities.

There are certain conditions under which education can effectively achieve the goal of gender equality. Such as, modification in legal, political and economic structure is mandatory. Additionally, change of socio-cultural norms are also a pre-requisite measure. In this way, di-facet approach can lead to gender equality.

Now, the women participation is 17% in National and Provincial Assembly, and 83% in local government respectively. 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equality in near future.
