for understanding gender inequality, power relations, and policy formulation in contemporary societies.

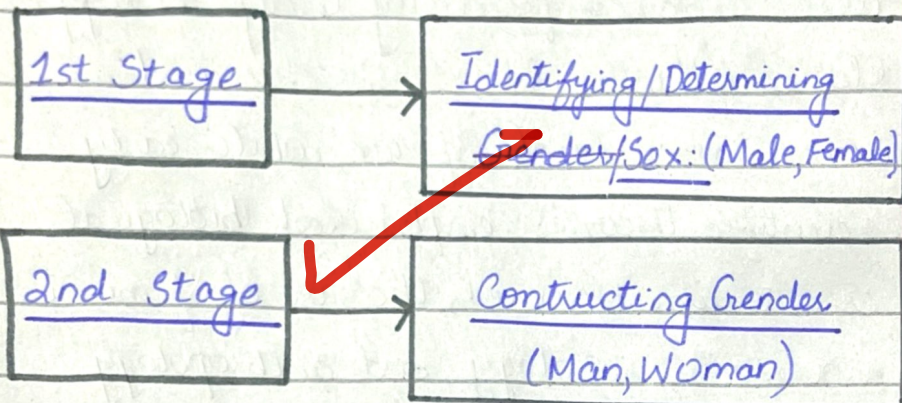
2. Background of the Debate:

Historically, gender differences were explained primarily through biology. Classical thinkers like Aristotle viewed women as natural inferior, while early scientific theories emphasized biological essentialism. However, the rise of feminist movements, sociology, and anthropology in 20th century challenged this view. Scholars began to highlight how institutions like family, education, religion and media construct gender identities. Thus, the debate evolved into a contest between nature versus nurture, shaping modern gender discourse.

3. Biological Determinism: Gender as Natural and Fixed

Biological determinism asserts that gender differences stem from biological factors, including hormones (estrogen and testosterone), chromosomes (XX and XY), and reproductive roles.

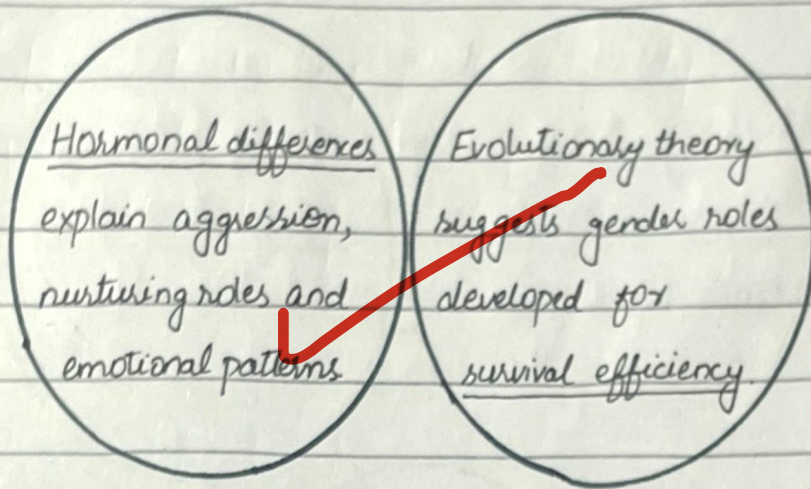
For example: Anatomy has given the role of childbirth to women.

3.2 Strengths of Biological Determinism:

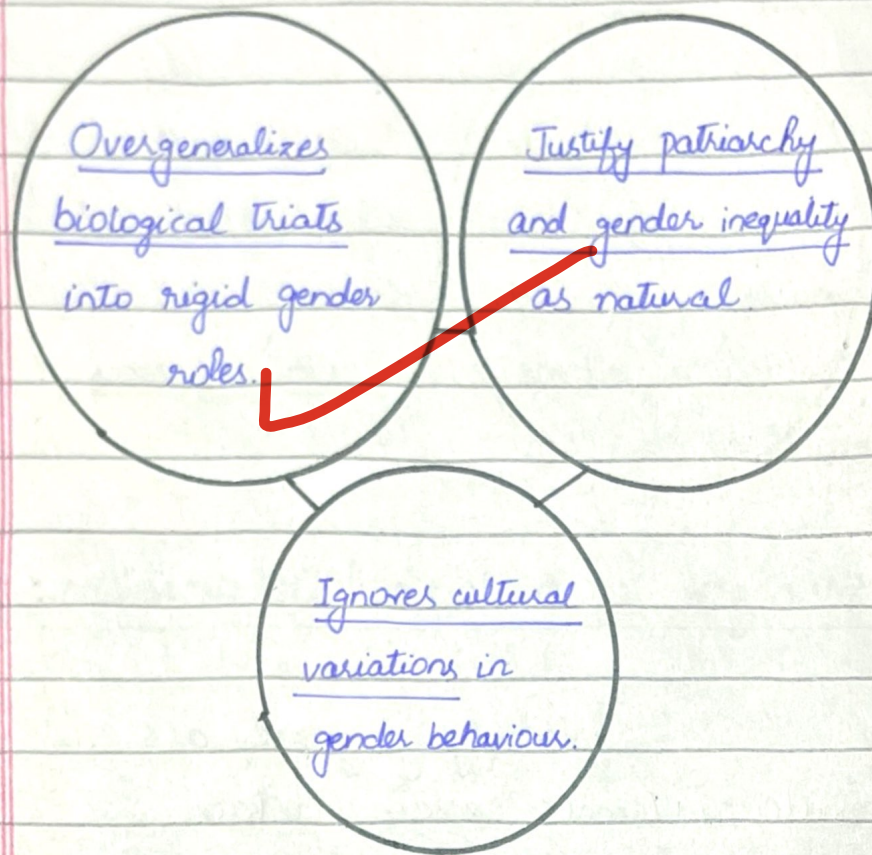
Identifying genders as male or female explains certain physical and reproductive differences as men are more strong than women and recognizes biological realities as role of pregnancy and childbirth is associated with female.

4. Social Constructionism: Gender as a Social Product

WHO defining Gender: Characteristics of women, men, girls and boys that are socially constructed. This includes norms, behaviours and roles associated with being a woman, man, girl or a boy and well as relationship with each other. As a social construct, gender varies from society to society and can

change over time."

Social constructionism argues that gender is learned, performed and reinforced through social interaction rather than biology.

4.1 Key Arguments of Social Constructionism:

(i) Role of Society in Gender Construction:

Gender is determined by society, not anatomy.

For example: Difference of gender roles in different societies, religions, cultures, eras, all have different definition of gender. Difference of gender roles in Matriarchal Society versus Patriarchal society where in matriarchal society, women are in leadership position, are breadwinners and lineage and inheritance are usually traced through the mother as opposite of today's patriarchal society.

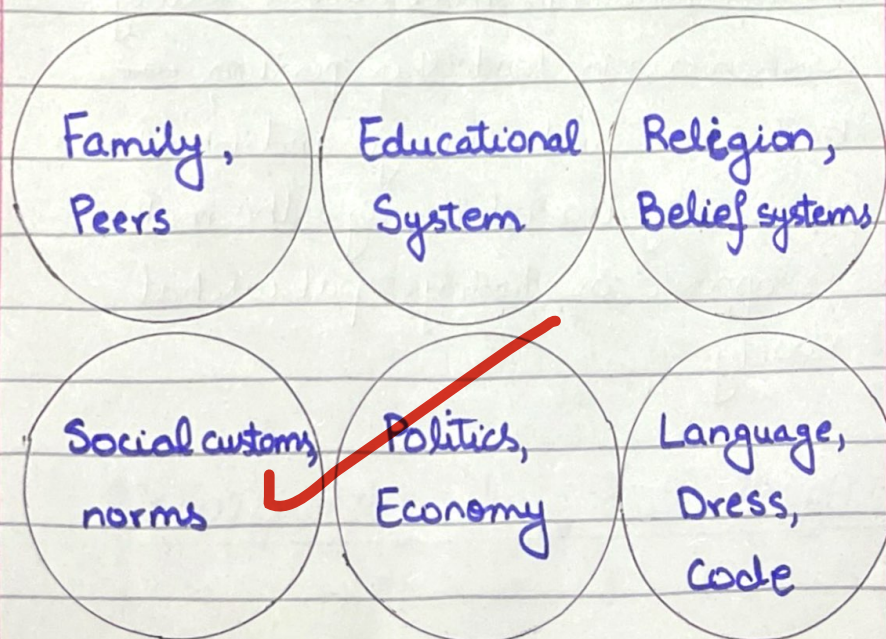
(ii) Agents of Social Construction:

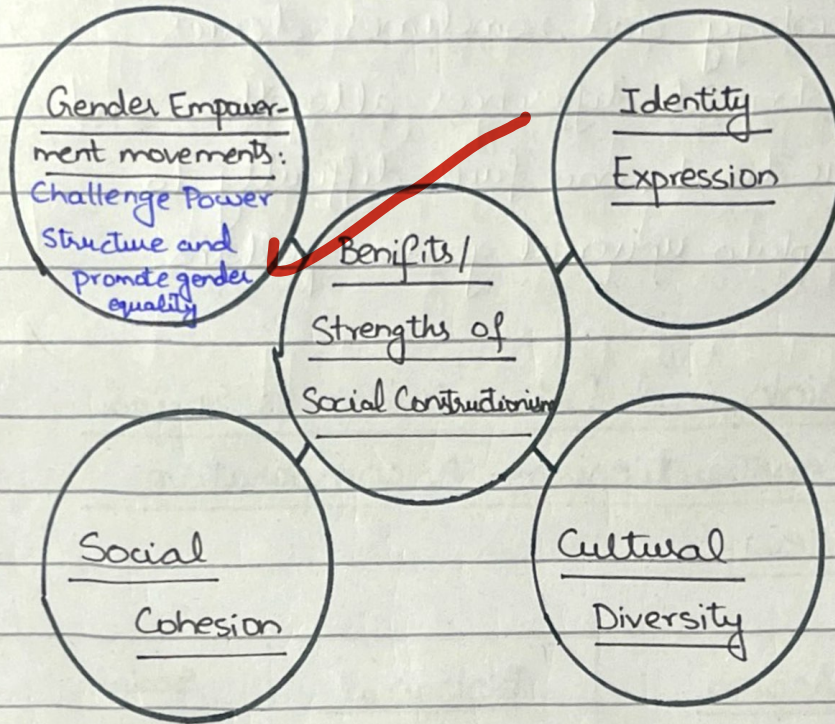

So society is the writer of individuals attributes, not his/her anatomy. Agents of social construction are following:

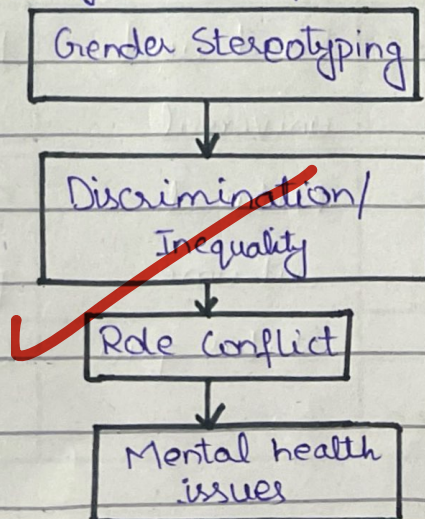


4.2 Strengths of Social Constructionism:
