Gender Studies:-

Gender Studies is an interdisciplinary field of study that explores the roles, experiences, and identities associated with gender and how gender intersects with other social categories such as race, class, sexuality, and disabilities. It examines the social, cultural, historical, and political constructions of gender and seeks to understand how these constructions shape individuals' experiences and societal structures.

Origin of Gender Studies:-

The origin of gender studies as an academic discipline can be traced to the intersection of feminist theory, sociological research, and interdisciplinary scholarship that emerged primarily in the 20th century. Following are key milestones in the development of the discipline:

Second Wave of Feminism:

The roots of gender studies lie in the feminist movement of the 1960s and 1970s, which challenged the traditional gender roles and advocated for women's rights. The second wave of feminism focused on how personal relationships and political and economic roles of women in the society were suffering from inequalities. The second wave also focused on how the academic disciplines and sets of knowledge excluded the interests, experiences and identities of women.

Women's Studies:

An important aspect of women's studies was conscious raising. In 1960s USA designed its first course. In 1970 women's studies was offered in San Diego State University and in 1980 in University of Kent.

Political Focus
