THE ESSAY

This is actually "illiberal" democracy — a system where elections exist but liberty, transparency and fairness are sacrificed at the altar of family legacy. This is not democracy in its true spirit. This is its worst mockery. Such type of politics makes the rule look like democracy, but in reality it operates like a monarchy in disguise. This system undermines the core principles of democracy — liberty, transparency,

public scrutiny, public participation — just to save the dynastic kingdom. Such transfer of inherited power not only sabotage of criterias of meritocracy, public service, competence and electoral win but also increase the public alienation, suppression of free speech and opposition, nepotism, corruption, economic and legal distortions. Therefore, dynastic politics mocks democracy socio-culturally, legally, economically and politically leaving narrow or no space for true democratic spirit.
