He recommended the application of Ijtihad against blind Taglid in his famous work.

Aqad al-jaiyad-fi-Ahkam-al-Ijtihad wa-al-Taglid.

His efforts to balance between Sufism and Shariah provided a moderate and inclusive understanding of Islam, helping reduce religious intolerance.

c Purifying Islamic Practice Through Hadith

He emphasized the study of Hadith (Prophetic traditions) and advocated for its centrality in Islamic jurisprudence, alongside the Quran. He wrote extensively to promote authentic religious practices and to purify Islam from un-Islamic innovations.

Shah Waliullah was a prolific writer. He authored over 50 books in Arabic and Persian, dealing with *fiqh* (Islamic law), *tafsir* (Quranic interpretation), *hadith*, philosophy, and politics. Some of his key works include:

He advocated for an Islamic state governed by Justice (adl), social welfare, and Shariah-based rule, but with an emphasis on Consultation (shura), moral leadership, and economic equity.
