Feminism: An Overview

Introduction:

Feminism is a socio-political movement that advocates for equal rights and opportunity for women, challenging the systematic oppression caused by patriarchy and gender discrimination. It seeks to dismantle societal structures that perpetuate inequality in economic, political and social spheres. Marie Shear defines feminism as:

"Feminism is a radical notion that women are people."

Overtime, different branches of feminism emerged to explain and address women oppression. Among them, Radical feminism and socialist feminisms are two major perspective that analyze gender inequality from distinct viewpoint. Radical feminism argues that patriarchy is the primary and deepest form of oppression, affecting all aspect of women. Socialist feminism contends that patriarchy and capitalism work together, to oppress women. Both perspective offer valuable insights into women's oppression, but differ in their explanation and solutions.

Patriarchal structure that historically oppressed women
 Feminism is not a monolithic ideology; it has evolved through different waves and schools of thought.
 Bell Hooks: "Feminism is a movement to end Sexism, sexist exploitation and oppression."
 Feminism movement consist of First, second and third wave of feminism.

Detail Analysis Over Radical feminism

"Patriarchy's chief institution is the family" - Kate Millet, sexual politics (1970)

Radical feminism emerged in the late 1960s as a response to the perceived limitation of liberal feminisms. It argues that patriarchy is the fundamental system of oppression affecting all aspect of women lives - social, political and economic.

Key Ideas of Radical feminisms

1) Patriarchy as the Root of oppression.

Radical feminist believe that patriarchy predates capitalism and exist in all societies.

Kate Millet, in her book sexual politics (1970) stated:

"Patriarchy's chief institution is the family."

This suggest that the family structure reinforce male dominance over women.

2) Control over women bodies.

"Sexism is the first form of oppression,
it is models of all others" - Andrea Dworkin.
Andrea Dworkin argues that Pornography
and sexual violence are a key tool of male
dominance.

Strategies for change:

1) separatism:

Some radical feminists advocate
for women-only spaces to escape from male
oppression.

2) Rejection from traditional femininity:

Opposes makeup, fashion, and gender roles
that reinforce male supremacy.

3) Revolutionary change

Reform is not enough, a complete
dismantling of patriarchal structures is needed.

Detailed analysis of socialist feminism

"Women work is never recognized as real labour under capitalism" — Juliet Mitchell.

Socialist feminism is a branch of feminism that combines Marxist and feminist theories to argue that both capitalism and patriarchy work together to oppress women. Socialists believe that economy and patriarchy are interconnected in oppression of women.

Key principles of socialist feminism

1) The link between capitalism and Patriarchy.

Socialists believe that women's oppression is economic in nature. Capitalism benefits from unpaid domestic labor and low-paid female workers.

"The marriage contract is a ^{work} unpaid contract that ensures unpaid labor." — Christine Delphy.

2) Domestic labor and the exploitation of women.

Women perform unpaid labor (housework, childcare) that sustains capitalism.

The economic dependence of women is the basis of their servitude.

Strategies for changes

① Economic reforms:
equal pay, labor rights, and
socialist policies that benefit women.

2) collective struggle.

women should unite with the working
class to fight capitalism and patriarchal
oppression.
