### A Introduction

Bari argues that true progress requires insulating Women's studies programs from political control, ensuring they remain spaces for independent and transformative scholarship.

### E The Autonomy/Integration Debate in Women's Studies

Women's Studies revolves around whether the discipline should exist as an independent field or be integrated into mainstream academic disciplines.

While autonomy allows women's studies to stay true to its feminist approach, it can sometimes lead to marginalization.



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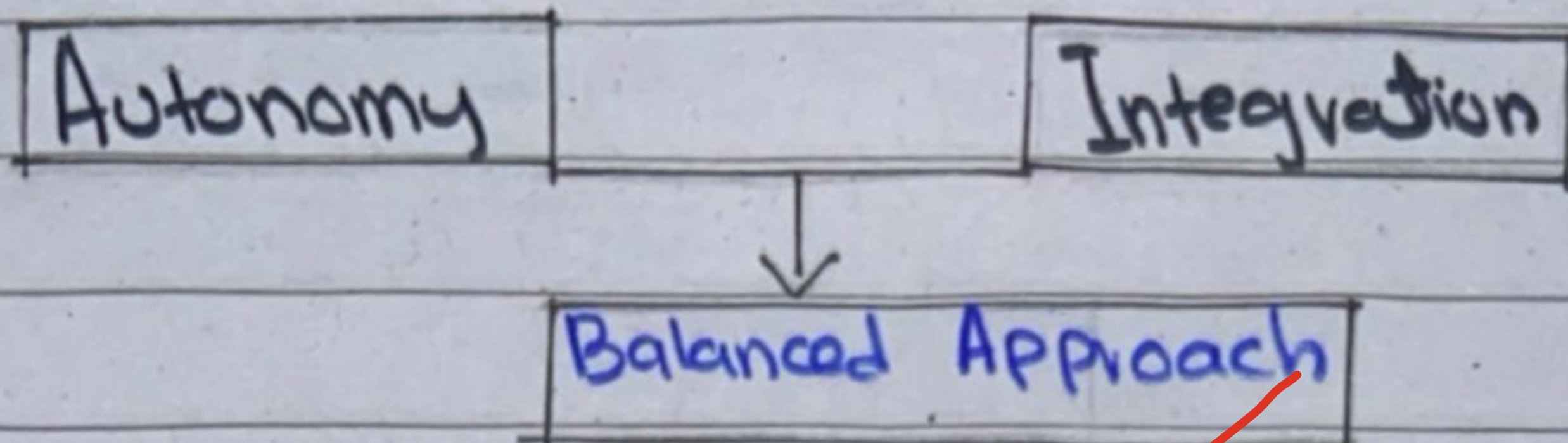
