The Cold War offered an opportunity to leverage global bipolarity for national survival. While India adopted a non-aligned posture, Pakistan chose to align with the Western bloc, driven by realist calculations of power and security.

3. Pakistani-U.S alliance strategic and military dimensions:

" Signing of Pacts: Pakistan's alliance with the U.S was formalised through its participation in SEATO (1954) and CENTO (1955).

These pacts positioned Pakistan as a frontline ally in the U.S-led containment strategy against communism. In return, Pakistan received substantial military aid, including advanced weaponry.

training, and infrastructure development. The U.S. also established intelligence facilities in Pakistan, such as the Badaber base near Peshawar, used for surveillance over Soviet territory.

However, the relationship was transactional. U.S. support waned during critical moments, such as the Indo-Pak war of 1965 and 1971, revealing the limits of alliance politics. Despite this, Pakistan remained a key strategic partner, especially during the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan in 1979, when it became a conduit for U.S. and Saudi support to Afghan mujahideen.

4. Impacts on Foreign Policy Orientation:

The Cold War shifted Pakistan's foreign policy from neutrality to bloc politics.

The alliance with the U.S. alienated the Soviet Union and pushed Pakistan closer to China, especially after the Sino-Indian war of 1952. Pakistan's role in facilitating U.S.-China rapprochement in

1971 further elevated its diplomatic profile.

This alignment also entrenched a security-centric foreign policy, dominated by military interests. Civilian institutions were sidelined, and foreign policy became increasingly militarised, particularly under regimes like ~~Gen. Ayub Khan~~ and ~~Gen. Zia-ul-Haq~~.

5. Socio-Political and Developmental impacts:

- i) Economic Development: US. ~~aid~~ aid contributed to major developmental projects, including the construction of dams i.e. Mangla, Tarbela roads, and industrial zones. These initiatives accelerated urbanisation and modernisation, particularly in Punjab and ~~Karachi~~.
- ii) Education and Cultural influence: American cultural diplomacy promoted English-language education, Western curricula, and media exchanges. Elite institutions like Lahore University of Management Sciences (LUMS) and the Institute of Business Administration (IBA)

reflected this influence. A western-leaning urban elite emerged, shaping Pakistan's intellectual and bureaucratic landscape.

iii) Militarisation and Authoritarianism:

Military aid strengthened the armed forces, leading to repeated military interventions in politics. The civil-military imbalance deepened, with foreign policy and development priorities ~~often~~ dictated by strategic rather than democratic considerations.

iv) Islamisation and ideological shifts:

During the Afghan Jihad, Pakistan fused Islamic identity with anti-Communist ideology. Zia-ul-Haq's regime institutionalised Islamisation, using religion as a tool of legitimacy and mobilisation. This had long-term consequences, including the rise of militant networks and sectarianism.

6. Long-Term Consequences:

The Cold War entrenched Pakistan's dependency on external aid and strategic alliances. While it gained short-term

security and development benefits, the long-term costs included political instability, ideological radicalisation, and a fragile democratic culture. Post-Cold War, Pakistan recalibrated its foreign policy, balancing ties with China the U.S., and regional actors.
