The life of Holy Prophet (PBUH) as a role model for human being encompasses all aspect of life. Beside all other facilities, as a military strategist too, he set the most perfect example of wisdom.

The Holy Prophet (PBUH) serves as a profound model for military strategy, emphasizing principles that transcend his historical context and remain relevant today.

Military organization & Tactics

The Prophet (PBUH) was aware of the importance of military training for Makkani Muslims even before the state of Medina was established. After establishing the first Islamic city state in 622 AD, he gave more attention to the military organization of Muslims.

Tactics used in Battle of Badr

In the Battle of Badr (624 AD), the Holy Prophet proved his consummate skills at carrying out military strategies. He sent spies to know the exact military strength of the enemy. He reached the battle ground before the enemy, got hold of the water source, selected a better position and organized his army into different ranks. The choice of ground and time of attack were crucial. He selected hard ground for his force but forced the Makkans to attack through soft sand with sun in their eyes. This strategy was decisive in the victory.

Uhud Battle strategy

only a year later (625 AD), the Quraysh attacked with a 3000 - strong army to avenge the defeat at Badr. Holy Prophet positioned his army of nearly 700 muslims on the western slope of the hill with Mount Uhud behind it. He posted a band of 50 archers under the command of Hazrat Abdullah bin Jubayr on a strategic pass. He strictly instructed the archers to, "Stick to your place, and don't leave it even if you see birds snatching us, till I send for you; and if you see that we have defeated the infidels and made them flee, even then you should not leave your place till I send for you." The initial Muslim victory was reversed into a defeat only because of the breach of his command by the archers who left their position to collect spoils of war.

Strategy used in Battle of Trench

In 627 AD, ~~Qura~~ Quraysh and their allies gathered a large army of more than 10,000 men to exterminate the Muslims. The Holy ~~pro~~ Prophet (PBUH) made Consultation (Shura) with his companions regarding Preparations. Based on the suggestion of Hazrat Salman (RA), a trench was dug on the only unprecedented side of Madinah. The trench, a revolutionary idea in Arabia, was too broad for the enemy's men or horses to pass, forcing the Confederacy to lay a Siege that ultimately failed due to internal annoyance and short supplies. The strategy saved the city of Madinah from

destruction.

Tactics used in Conquest of Makkah

In 630 AD, after Quraysh broke the truce of Hudaibiyyah, Holy Prophet (PBUH) ordered 10,000 soldiers to cook individually, which resulted in 10,000 fires being seen from a distance. which shattered the enemy's morale and forcing their surrender without bloodshed. After conquest, he showed mercy by announcing a general amnesty for all Makkans, which was a strategic move that led to their conversion to Islam and consolidated muslim strength.

The Strategy of Jihad

The Jihad strategy was primarily employed after the migration to Madinah, once the prophet (PBUH) had accumulated sufficient strength. Jihad, in this context is not merely warfare but a principled engagement for defence and the establishment of justice. This strategy often involved surrounding the enemy to force an unconditional surrender, as seen in the Ghazwah Banu Qainqa (2AH). The Prophet (PBUH) imposed a siege that lasted 15 nights, leading to the enemy's unconditional surrender. Another key aspect is the engagement strategy of simultaneous attack on multiple fronts, as demonstrated during the conquest of Makkah (8AH), where muslim fighters entered the city from all four corners.

Swiftess Strategy

This strategy, analogues to the modern concept of

First Mover advantage, involved gaining a time-based competitive edge by moving quickly, often using difficult routes, to seize resources and strategic resources.

For example, in Ghazwah Khaibar (7, A.H), the Prophet (PBUH) and his companions covered 160 kilometers in just six days. This rapid movement took the Jewish enemies by surprise and prevented their allies, Bani Ghatafan from joining the fight.

Steadfast (Al-Sabirun) strategy

Rooted in the Quranic concept of Sabr, this strategy is employed by those who possess Tawhid and Tawakkul to achieve success. It is the characteristics of those brave enough to challenge a bigger-sized enemy army. The strategy draws from the verse: "How often a small group overcame a mighty army by Allah's grace? And Allah is with As-Sabirun." (Surah Al-Baqarah: verse 249). This provided the moral and psychological fortitude necessary for victory against numerically superior foes.

Harm prevention strategy

This strategy focuses on risk management and proactive measures to protect the Muslim community from harm. It involves both defensive and pre-emptive actions. In Battle of trench, The Prophet (PBUH) instructed the digging of a ditch as a best option to protect the Muslim against a confederate army that outnumbered him three to one.

Vigorous Image Strategy

This strategy is meant to show a strong image in

front of the enemy. Allah Commanded Prophet Muhammad and Muslims to prepare and show their strength. "And Muster against them whatever force and war ~~mounts~~ mounts at your disposal so that you may strike ~~terror~~ into the enemies of Allah and your enemy And other besides them whom you do not know, but Allah does" (Surah Anfal: verse 60)

Peace strategy

In the Prophet's war and Quranic context, Peace Strategy materialized when two or more fighting Parties were willing to stop fighting, whether to have Peace with ~~cooperation~~ cooperation or just Peace without Cooperation. Early ~~example~~ examples include the Madinah Constitution, which established Peace with Jews after the migration and later peace treaties negotiated with local tribes concerning the commercial blockade by the Quraysh.

Dynamic Strategy

The Dynamic strategy is based on the Principle of adaptability and changing the prior strategy or goal to suit the prevailing environment. This demonstrated the prophet's (PBUH) Prioritization of long-term Political or strategic gains over immediate tactical ones. The Strategic masterpiece of this approach was the treaty of Hudaibiyah where prophet (PBUH) demonstrated the Dynamic Strategy by changing his goal from performing umrah to securing a truce, ultimately diffusing conflict and paving the way for the bloodless conquest of Makkah.

The Holy Prophet (PBUH) is the most Supreme role model for military strategists of all times. His military leadership achieved ~~unparalleled~~ unparalleled success by mastering the diversity of military strategy, blending advanced tactical planning with unwavering ethical conduct.
