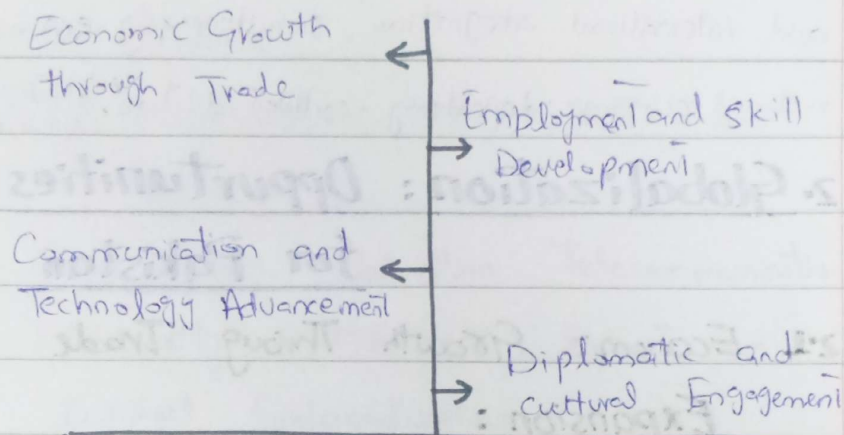

4. Conclusion

Every night, thousands of Pakistanis open their laptop to work in the American and European countries. From graphic designing to teaching, they earn in thousands of foreign currency while sitting at their places. This is the real face of globalization which is interconnected with goods and services and these move freely beyond the borders. For Pakistan, globalization has brought both doors of opportunities and challenges. It grows interconnection of states through trades, communication, culture, social, political perspectives. On these bases, interaction of Pakistan has developed between similar state entities like Pakistan - China, Pakistan - Saudi Arabia, and diverse entities such as relation between Pakistan and organizations (WB, IMF etc), or Al-Qaeda etc. These give some opportunities to Pakistan by reshaping the industries, transforming youth employment, and opening new

diplomatic channels. However, the same process has increased competition, widened inequality, and raised concerns about national identity. Therefore, globalization is not a curse or blessing for Pakistan; in fact it is a double-edged reality that demands management wisely by strengthening its economy, protecting cultural identities and integrity, and ensuring sovereignty while participating in the global system.

Firstly, globalization has been a driving force behind Pakistan's economic expansion by integrating its market into global system. Pakistan has gained access to international market through CPEC - China Pakistan Economic corridor causing trade liberalization and regional connectivity. Its extension has reached to modern infrastructure and industrial investment.

The European Union (EU) continues to enhance Pakistan's textile industry exports, which reached around US \$ 32 billion in FY 2024-25 according to state Bank of Pakistan. Moreover, FDI - Foreign Direct Investment from China, UAE and Saudi Arabia has supported infrastructure and energy projects. Additionally, Gwadar Port and other economic zones strengthened regional trade routes, linking Pakistan to Central Asia and Middle East. These developments collectively promote employment, boost government revenue and improve Pakistan's position in global chain value. The sustainability of such economic growth depends upon domestic productivity, diversification of export and manufacturing values. Thus, these developments indicate that globalization can be a major force of economic modernization and competitiveness for Pakistan.

Secondly, the impact of globalization in Pakistan is the rise in employment and skill development opportunities, particularly among the youth. The digital economy has created thousands of IT based jobs and freelancing, making Pakistan one of the top five freelancing nations, earning over \$ 779 million annually, as per the Pakistan Software Export Board (PSEB, 2025). Global platforms such as Upwork, Fiverr and Toptal enables youth to earn in foreign currencies while staying within the country. Simultaneously, multinational corporations like Nestlé, Coca-Cola, and Unilever have trained thousands of local workers, creating a skilled labour force. The spread of global education networks and online courses have also improved professional capacities. For examples collaborations between Coursera and Pakistani universities have made global skilled training accessible. Additionally, overseas employment

contributes billions in remittances annually, which supports national development.
