

The Article "Easing Repatriating" is all about the Afghan families turning back across the border. Since April, almost half a million of Afghan refugees have returned back to their country. Out of which, 100,000 crossed the border in the first week of September. UNHCR, the UN refugee agency has announced "crisis within crisis" because forced return of refugees and natural disaster, Earthquake, are hitting the state at the same time. Pakistan has carried out burden of Afghan displacement for decades without an adequate foreign assistance.

Main obstacle encountered by refugees is not by Pakistan but by Kabul's own policies. The Taliban have tied the hand

of agencies meant to ease the transition. Not only banning Afghan women working with UN, they also caution to work cash and support center that ~~was~~ is mainly associated in helping refugees. Kabul's rulers are worsening the suffering of their own people.

A little effort from both side, Islamabad offering some flexibility in timeline and Afghanistan lifting restrictions on social work can create ease in transition process. Such cooperation might even open space for dialogue between Pakistan and its Neighbouring Country.
