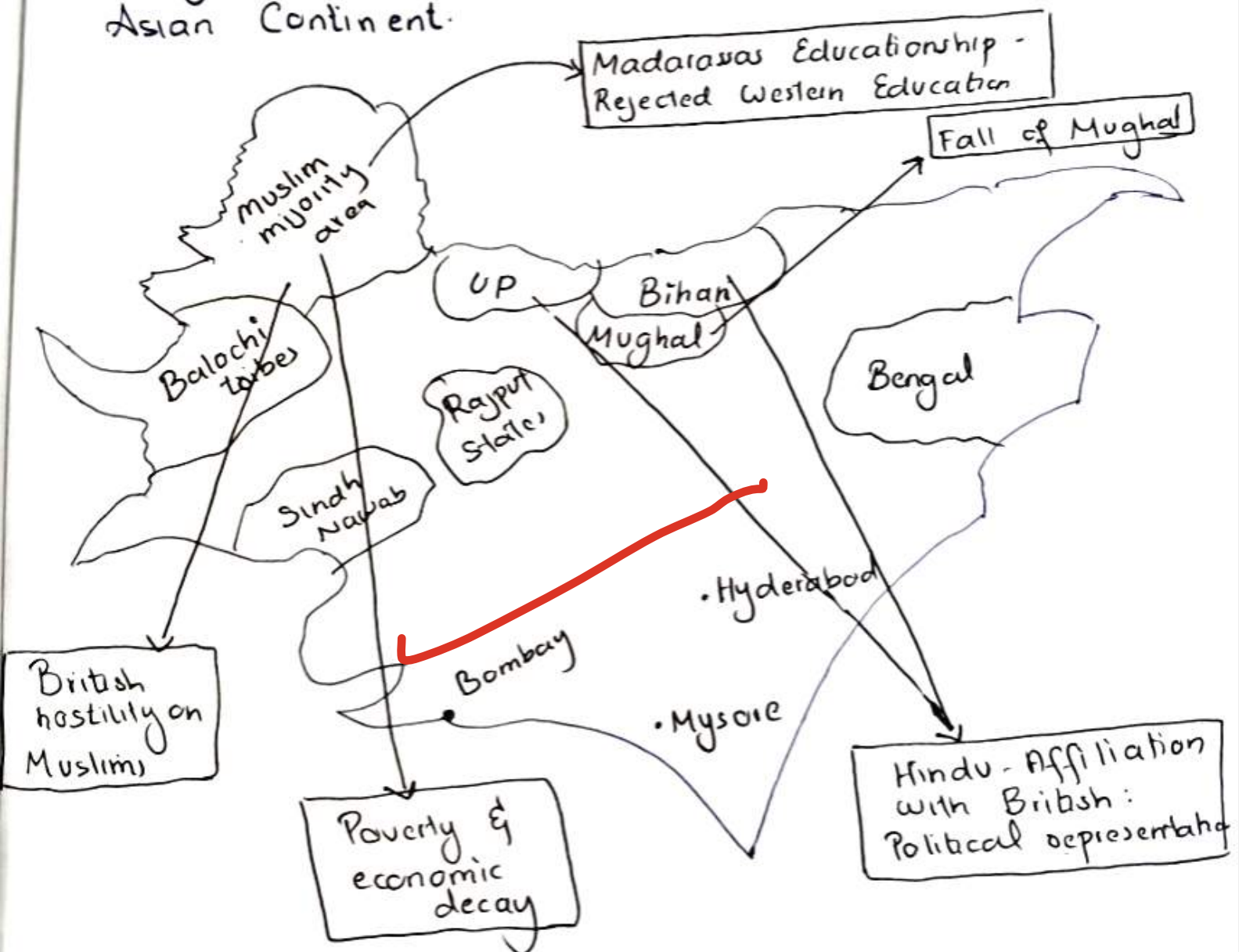
Despite the challenges, his unorthodox yet vigilant approach, laid the formation of modern muslim identity

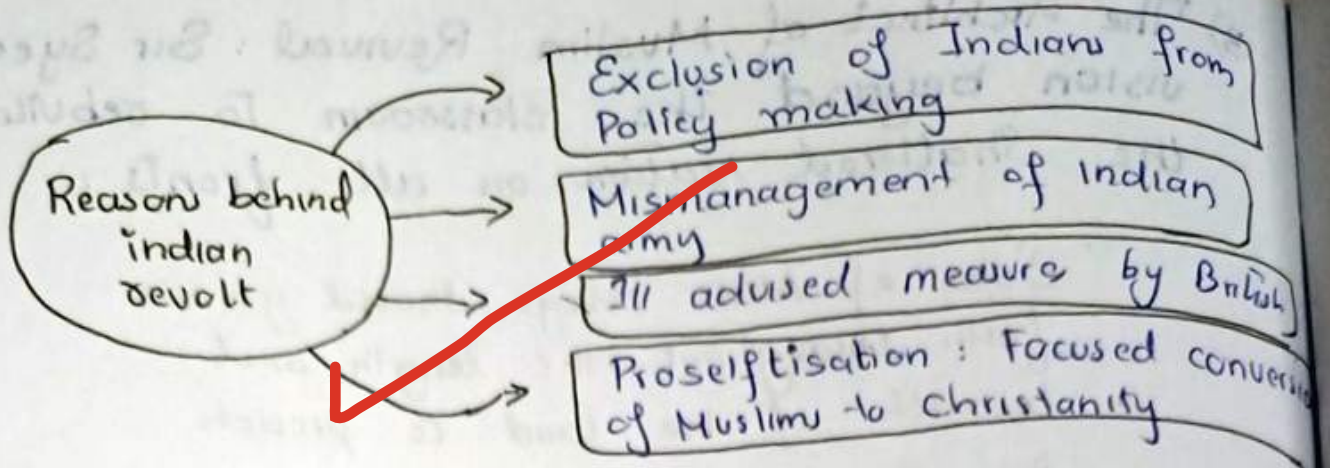

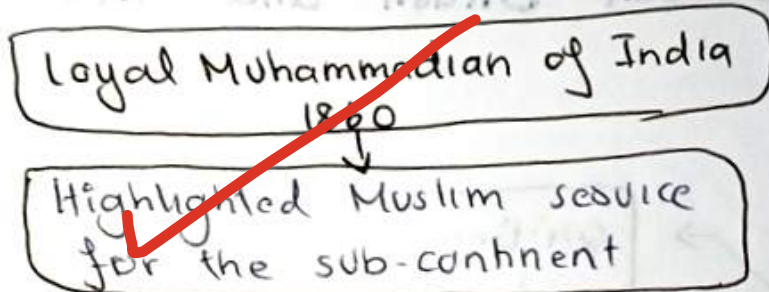

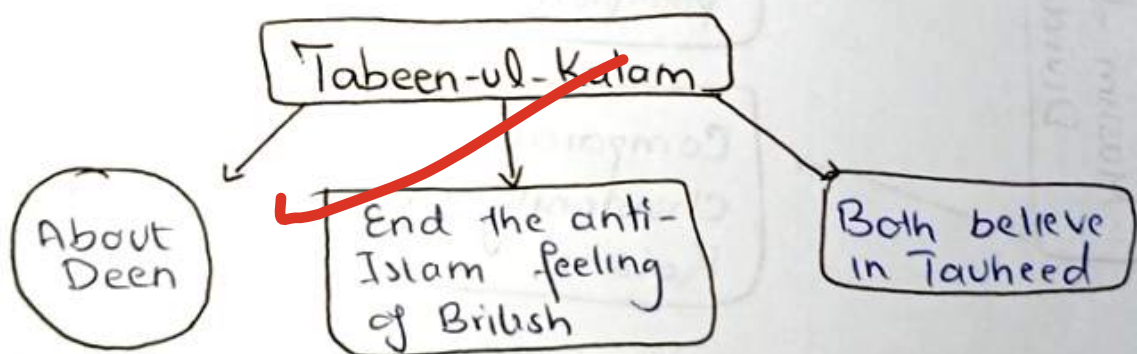

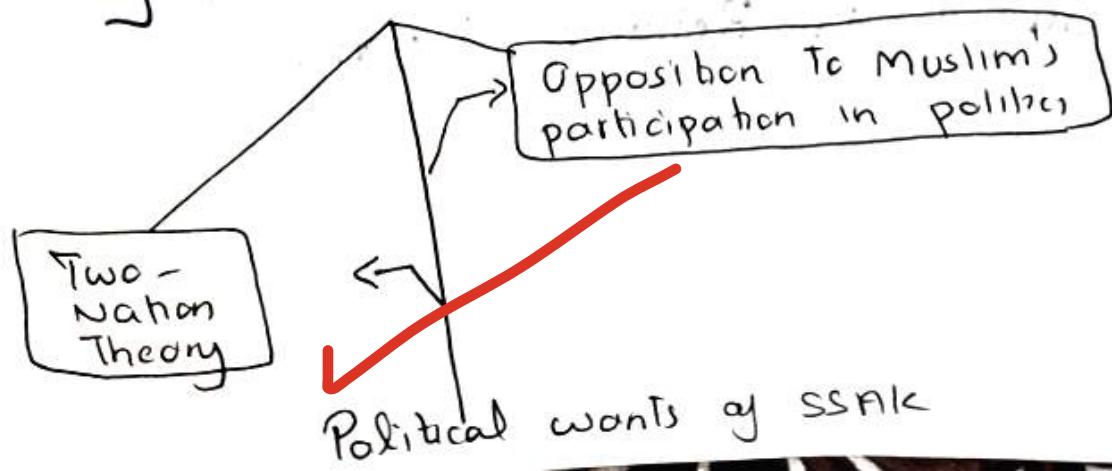

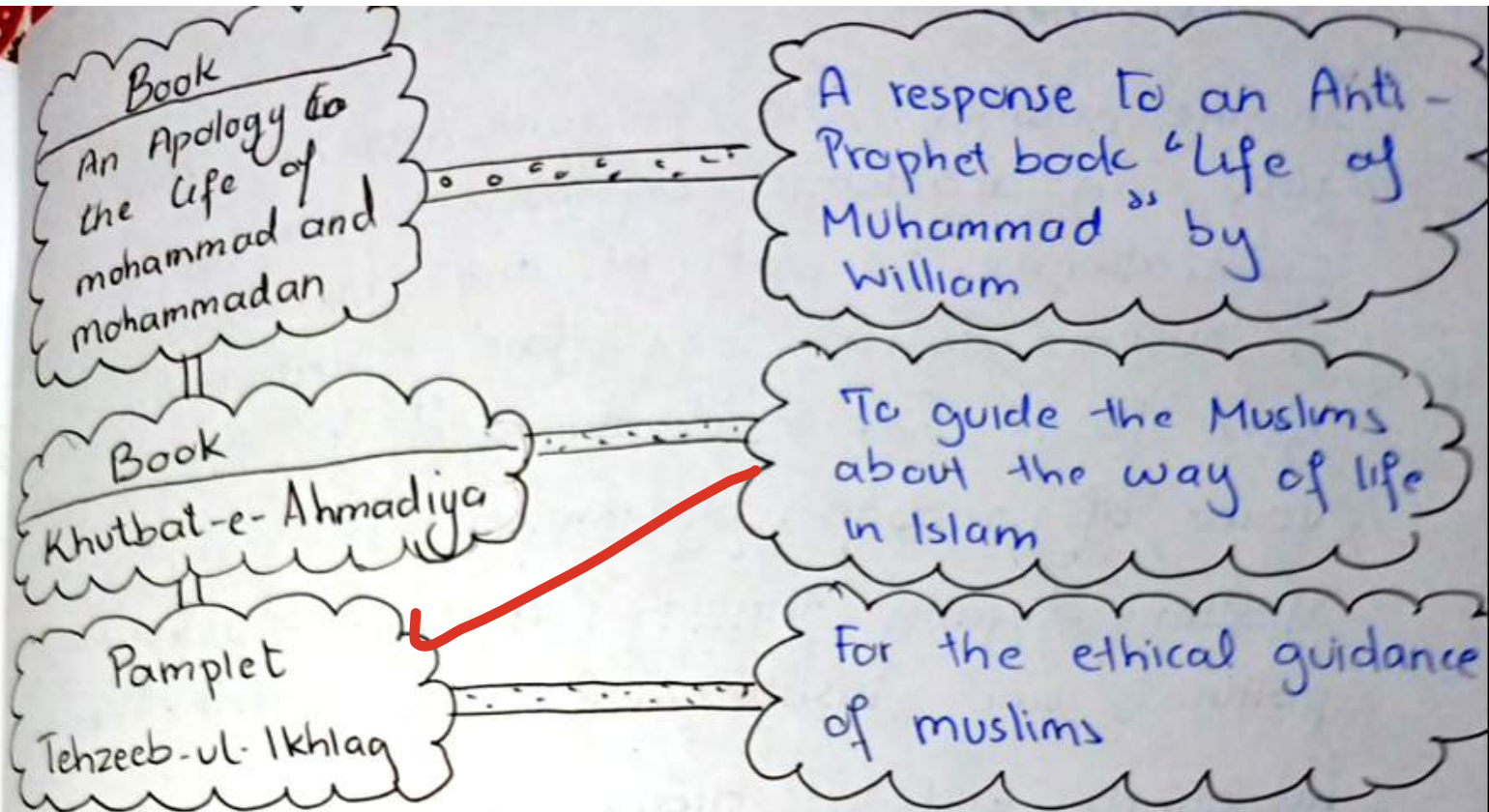

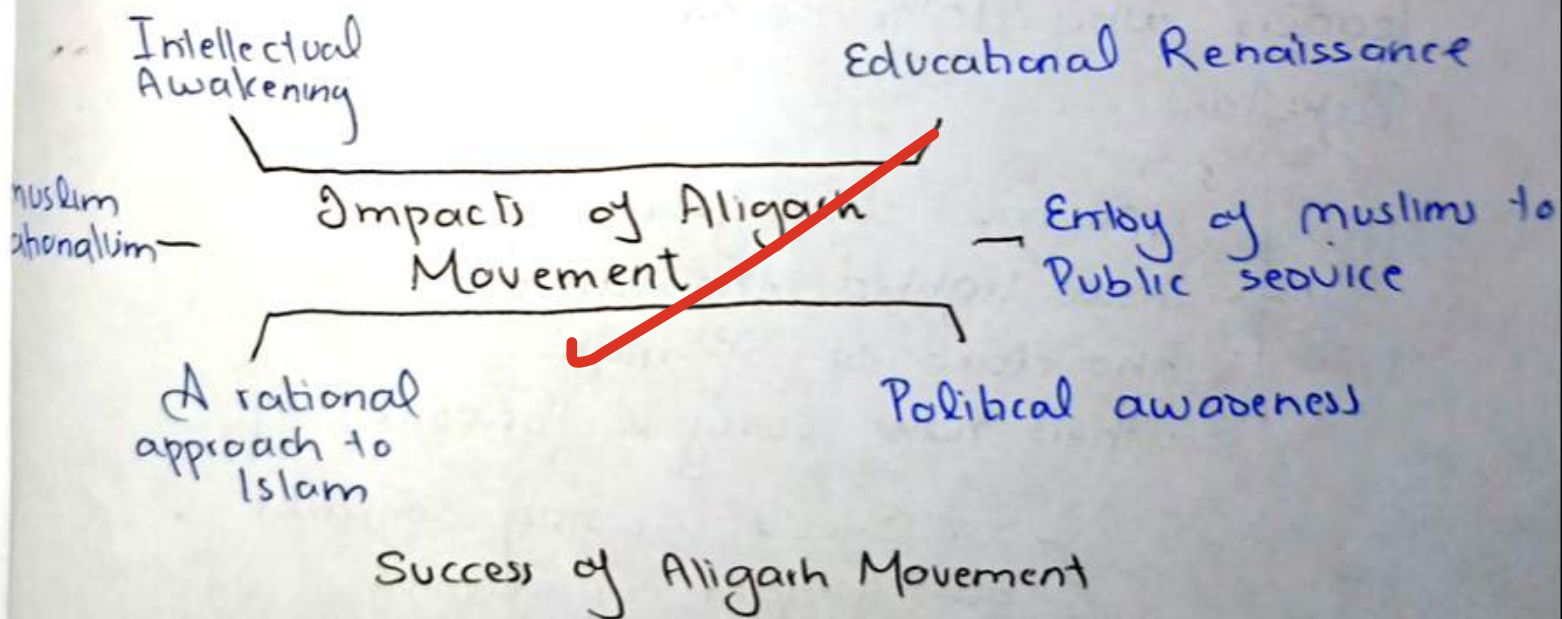
