PRECIS:

Pakistan: Mirror of Disciplined Army, and Layered Identities

While discussing discipline of Pakistan army, and layered social identities in Pakistani society in his book *Pakistan: A Hard Country*, Anatol Lieven refutes the possibility of a national revolution in Pakistan. If anything, mutiny of soldiers against their commanders can lead to a civil war. But even for this mutinous scenario to come to pass, the soldiers have to be in a position where their officers turn a blind eye to an open aggression against Pakistan. Pakistan would collapse under the weight of civil strife if the army is thus radicalized and disunited. Moreover, Lieven draws attention to regional importance being attached with politics, as in one party representing a particular province. Nevertheless, Pakistani society is replete with identities within identity overlapping with still other identities, in contrast to a single outlook. Only some Islamists and some of the soldiers have somewhat single identity. As one learned Lahori told the writer, Pakistanis cannot unite behind anything, much less a revolution!

A range of attributes made Heinz Guderian a talented and rebellious commander. He was naturally gifted; tenacious enough to lead from front and subdue his peers. However, his unabashed zeal also made him a rebellious commander with a knack to shout in the face of his supreme commander, Adolf Hitler.

Guderian's most lethal offensive tactic was element of surprise. He left no time in immobilizing the enemy's forces. The most important tool for this purpose was the weapon of tank. His panzer corps was embedded with support and supply services. This way, he could thrust forward and not wait for or rely on side flanks to catch up.

If Guderian's fault was unresigned initiative and disobedience, Hitler was let down by his inflexibility in not authorizing a retreat. When the German troops had been bottled up in Kustein, Guderian tried to convince Hitler for ordering retreat. Failing to persuade, he shouted in the face of Hitler; and that is how both fell out with each other.

- (ii) -

Relieve from command spared Guderian from prosecution of war crimes. It proved to be a blessing for him in the aftermath of the Second World War. He did not have to answer for criminal proceedings on account of his timely departure.

- (v) -

Had Guderian been retained in command, he would have been tried for war crimes in international tribunals. It could ^{have} lead to his life sentence, if not summary punishment of death. His departure, though premature, saved him from possible disgrace, even death.
