

Precis

The passage highlights the Unfair Treatment faced by Pakistani citizens when applying for Schengen Visas. It compares the rejection process to an unjust dismissal, where applicants' efforts are overlooked. Common reasons for rejection, such as incomplete documents, questionable bank balances, or unclear intentions, are equated to a teacher dismissing a student's work without proper evaluation. In contrast, when citizens from western countries apply for Pakistani visas, they are warmly received. The author argues that Schengen countries unjustly stereotype Pakistanis as potential threats, despite the significant time, effort, and cost involved in applying.
