* INTEGRATION DEBATE

The integration debate means that earlier, women struggled for integration into this patriarchal system. They demand voting rights through the various Suffragist Movements. Finally, they got ~~to~~ their voting rights after ~~that~~ would ~~be~~ in US. They are more cooperative in nature, and talk of getting rights while remaining in this system. This integration debate started in the first wave of feminism in the early half of 20th century and in 19th century. They protested for their rights which had been curbed severely as mentioned

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by Simon De Beauvoir in her book, "The Second Sex." This situation has also been mentioned in the book, "Private property: State and Society". This movement had an evolutionary approach, and believed in evolution, rather than revolution. 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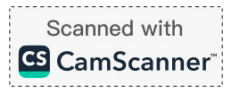
