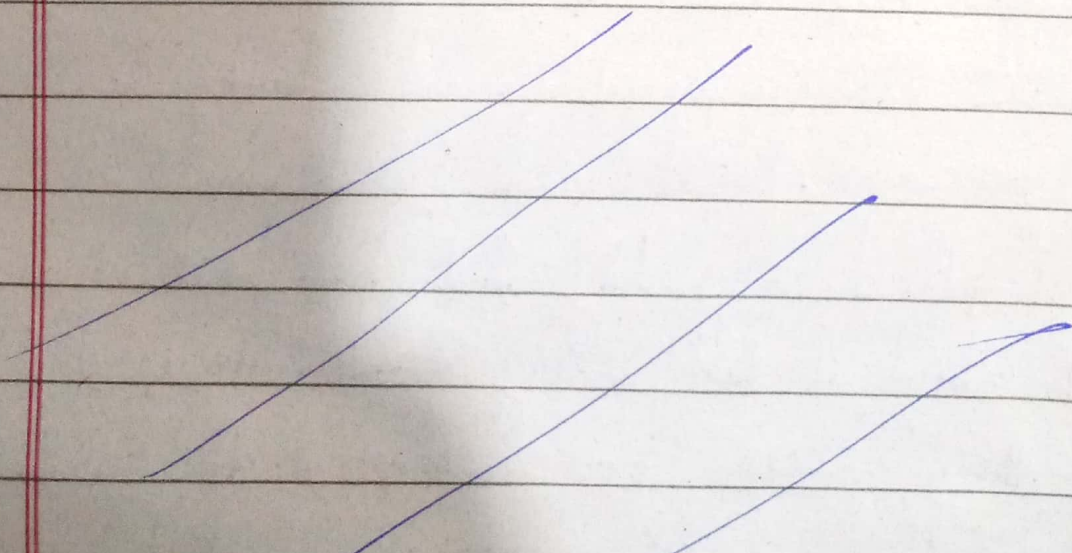

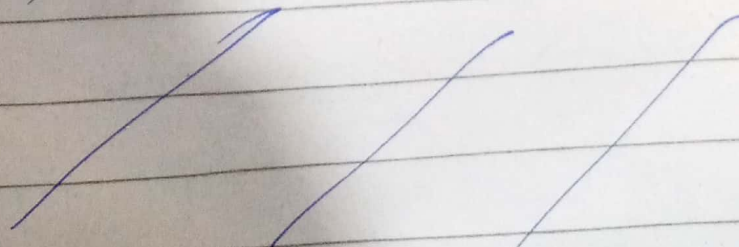
Hence, not only the judiciary but also other political and social institutions influence the role of the courts.
