In a climate change story, WWF took the olympics - a cultural reference point that belongs to everyone, all over the world - and imagined how sporting events would look if this climate emergency goes unchecked. Glossy photos of pristine swimming pools and sports stadiums are suddenly choked with rubbish or covered by floodwaters. As readers scroll through the article, they see a horrifying glimpse of one potential future.

This imagination is an evidence of prevailing global emergency in the form of climate change. It is happening even more quickly than we feared. The fragile economic conditions put the developing countries at greater risk of victimization than the more advanced nations that have stronger capacity to adapt. Pakistan being developing country is at greater risk due to climate change.

Natural causes include Earth's orbit, rotation and reflectivity. However, human-driven causes like green house gases, careless use of land, waste products and lack of education are having more severe effects than natural causes. They are resulting in ecological effects, agricultural impacts, water issue, health problems, socio-economic challenges and predominant effects on women.
