

Instructions to Get Good Marks in Islamiat Paper

- 1- Try adding at least 2-3 Arabic version of ayah
- 2- Go for diversification of resources e.g. From Hadith, Quran, Books, Islamic Philosophers etc.
- 3- Add Surah name for the Relatable Question e.g. you can add name of Surah Anzab and Nisa in women related question,
- 4- The sermon of Prophet PBUH can be added in any of the question as a reference as it encompassing points of all aspects
- 5- Use the verdicts or incidents and case studies of Khilafat Era in Political Economic and Social system of Islam
- 6- Balance all parts, if the question has 2 or 3 parts give equal weightage
- 5- Add flowcharts or Graph where you can
- 7- Focus more on the asked part than to write irrelevant material.... read question 2-3 times so that you cannot deviated
- 8- Write 10-11 headings for each question
- 9- Go for 7-8 sides answer
- 10- Contemporary relevant question must be attempted by giving the examples and case studies of past to make it Islamiat paper

Zakat is not only voluntary charity — it is a right of the poor and an obligation upon the rich.

"...They ask you what they should spend. Say: 'The excess (beyond your need)'." Quran (2:219)

The Prophet (PBUH) said:
"Wealth does not decrease because of charity" Hadith (Sahih Muslim)

1. Social Impacts of Zakat:

a. Poverty Alleviation:

Zakat reduces poverty by providing for the poor, orphans, widows, and others in need. It helps them become self-reliant.

"Zakat is for the poor, the needy, those employed to collect it,

those whose hearts are to be reconciled, to free captives, for those in debts, for Allah's cause, and for the stranded traveler..." Quran: (9:60)

b. Wealth Redistribution:

Zakat promotes economic justice by redistributing wealth. It ensures that money does not stay in few hands.

"... So that it does not circulate only among the rich from you..." (59:7)

c. Social Solidarity:

Zakat builds a sense of brotherhood and unity in society. It makes a bridge between rich and poor.

The Prophet (PBUH) said: "The likeness of believers in regard to mutual love, mercy and compassion is that of one body..." Hadith (Tirmidhi)

2. Moral Impacts:

a. Purification of the Soul:

Zakat cleanses the heart from greed and selfishness, encouraging contentment and gratitude.

b. Development of Compassion:

reach (wasteful)... " Quran (17:29)
