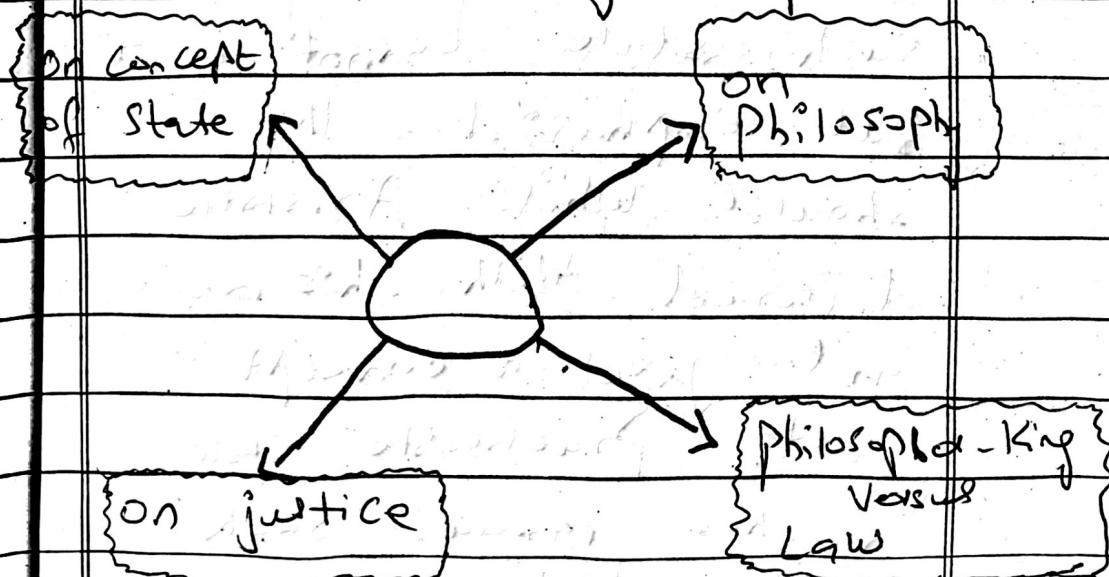

A) On Philosophy

Plato

was an idealist. His political philosophy was based on idealism. While Aristotle was pragmatic and a realist. His political philosophy was based on realism and pragmatism.

B) On Concept of State

Plato envisaged an ideal state in his Magnum Opus "Republic". He himself admitted that such state cannot exist but emphasized that it should. While, Aristotle differed with his matter and gave a concept of best practicable state in his famous book "Politics".

C) on justice

Plato found justice in his principle of Specialization. According to this principle, every man should do the work only, for which he is best suited according to his aptitude and talent. But, Aristotle found justice in observance of law. To him, law was the absolute guarantee for justice.

D) Philosopher-King vs Law

Plato said in his 'Republic' that Philosopher-King should rule the state as he got all the pre-requisites of a good ruler. But Aristotle, his disciple differed. He said that

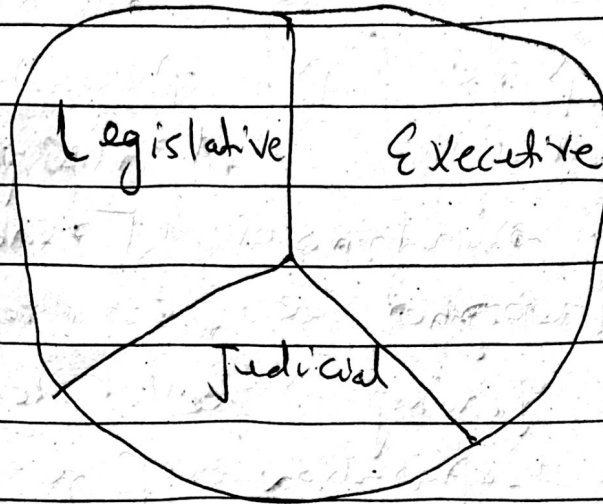

For example, in US, Supreme Court can declare any act of Congress and President as unconstitutional.

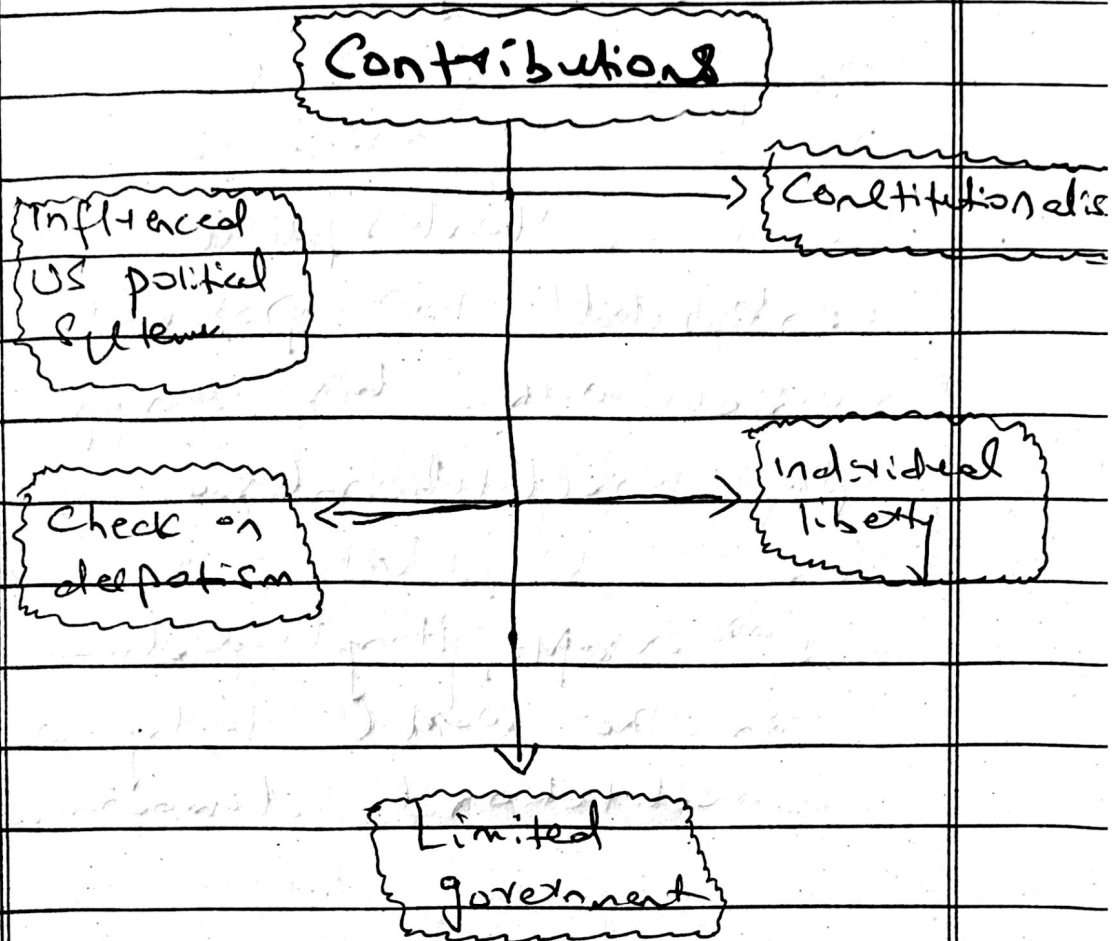

A) Racism and Nationalism

Both fascism and Nazism are racist and nationalistic ideologies. Fascism emerged in Italy post-World War I. Mussolini wanted to revive glorious Roman Empire. While, Nazism is also racist and nationalistic put forward by Adolf Hitler. He deemed Germans as only superior race.

B) Expansionism and Violence

Both glorified violence and expansionism. Mussolini and Hitler captured and conquered many European, African and Asian countries during inter war period (1919-1939). In order to capture territories,

they resorted to violence and blood-letting.

C) Love war, hate Peace

Both adore war and abhor peace. They always wanted to see the world in the state of war. To them, Peace is a sign of weakness while, war is a sign of strength.

D) Based on fear

Both ideologies are based on fear. They instill fear in their followers of supposed dangers. They thrive in fear. Hitler instilled fear of other races, particularly Jews in German people. As a result, 6 million Jews

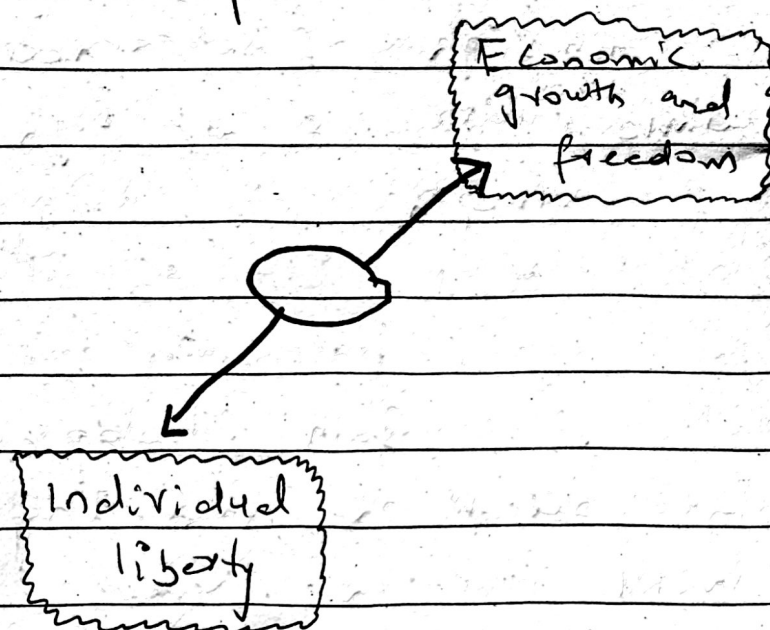

"An aggregate of individuals, having definite organisation, believing in some common principles, with the aim to capture political power with peaceful means"

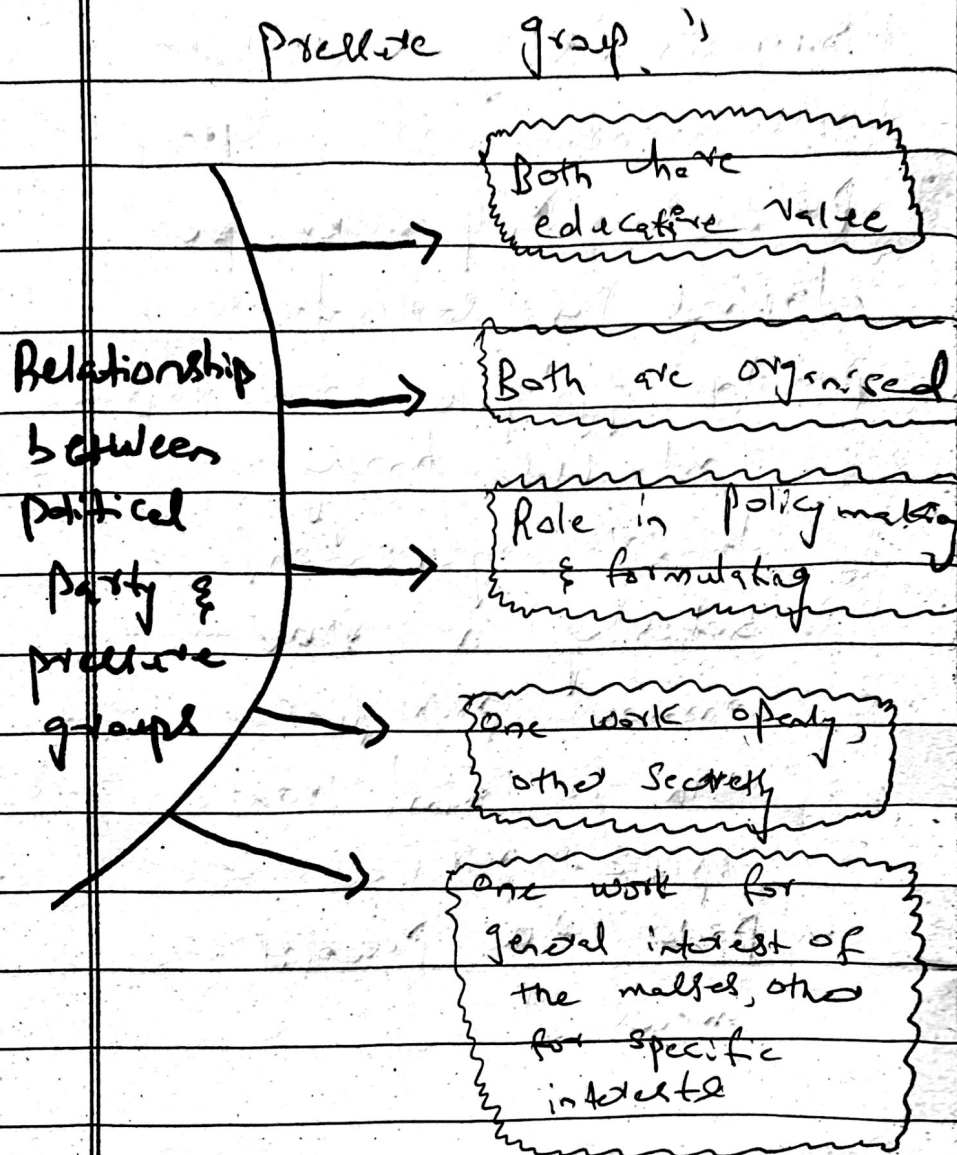
