The Misleading Power of Ad Hominem Attacks

The passage explains the ad hominem fallacy, in which a person attacks an opponent instead of addressing the argument. A British courtroom anecdote shows this tactic being advised when no real case exists. Lincoln also used a mild form of ad hominem as a young lawyer by ridiculing his opponent's odd, backward-buttoning shirt to sway frontier (jurors) jurors, despite the opponent's stronger legal points. Although sometimes used cleverly, this fallacy is often harmful; its misuse is evident when critics dismissed Roosevelt's policies simply because they came from "that cripple in the white house." The text shows that ad hominem has long been used to influence people by discrediting individuals rather than engaging with issues.
