Introduction:

History of philosophy is marked by some of the most remarkable teacher and student relationships such as Aristotle and Plato. These two personalities whose ideas shaped Western intellectual tradition. Aristotle studied in Plato's academy for almost twenty years. However, Aristotle respected Plato but did not agree with many of his basic theories. The saying "Aristotle was a great but not a grateful student" means that while Aristotle respected Plato, he was not afraid to correct his teacher's ideas. He went on to build his own philosophy, often opposed to Plato's views. (The) Aristotle was greatness on own thinking to build a new system of philosophy based on observation and common sense. Aristotle and Plato: A student who changed his Teacher's Ideas

① The Critique of the Theory of Forms:

Plato believed that perfect ideas exist in a separate world. Our world only has poor copies. Aristotle disagreed on his stance. He said the real world is the one where we live.

② Concept of Knowledge: Empiricism vs. Rationalism

For Plato, knowledge is recollection of pre-existing ideas. The true knowledge is remembering what our souls knew before birth from the world.

Aristotle stressed on empirical observation. He said that we learn by using our senses such as seeing, touching, hearing. Knowledge comes from experience.

③ Political System

Plato's political system was based on the ruled by philosopher-kings where they have no private property for rulers. Whereas, Aristotle is too idealistic. He studied over 150 real city governments. A good state is one where the middle class is strong, and laws are

practical - He thought Plato's plan was unrealistic.

④ Difference in Ethical Thought

Plato saw virtue as knowledge and defined the good as the form of the Good. Aristotle rejected a single universal good. He said that good life (eudaimonia) is achieved by building good character habits like courage and honesty.

⑤ Concept of State and Citizenship.

Plato's ideal state was rigidly structured and hierarchical. Aristotle preferred a pluralistic society. He emphasized to recognising the role of middle class and mixed constitution.

⑥ Epistemology: Plato's Dialectica Vs. Aristotle's Logic

Plato relied on dialectical reasoning to reach higher truths. Aristotle constructed formal

logic and creating syllogism. This provided a rigorous, rule-based framework for demonstrative science. Aristotle's logic was the first systematic logical method in history.

⑦ Rejection of Plato's Communism of Women and People

Plato proposed communal sharing of wives, children, and property is only for guardian class. Aristotle sharply criticised this calling it against natural affection and responsibility.

⑧ Psychology: The Soul as the form of the Body

Plato viewed the soul as a pre-existing, immortal, and separable entity temporarily imprisoned in the body. Aristotle's soul was the form of the body which is inseparable from the living organism. Aristotle, in *De Anima* defined the soul as:

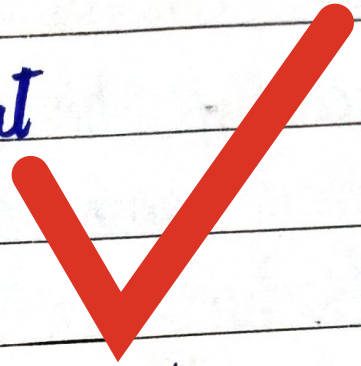
"The first actuality of a natural body that has life potentially."

Montesquieu is considered to be Aristotle of the 18th Century. Explain with reference to his contributions to political science, especially his theory of separation of powers and comparative ~~methodology~~ ^{methodology}.

Introduction:

The title "Aristotle of the 18th Century" for Baron de Montesquieu is a profound acknowledgment of his foundational role in modern political science. Aristotle is known as the Father of Political Science because he studied states scientifically, compared different constitutions and developed clear principles of politics. His two monumental contributions such as theory of separation of powers and comparative methodology linking laws to a society's environment and spirit. "The spirit of law (1748) introduced the theory of separation of powers which has become a cornerstone of liberal democracies. organs of the state.

Montesquieu's Theory of separation of powers

① Separation of Powers Guarantees Liberty and Rule of Law:

According to Montesquieu, liberty is not license but security under law. This is his most famous contribution. He argued that the independence of each branch ensures that laws are applied equally. Citizens are protected and despotic rule is prevented.

“There is no liberty if the power of judging is not separated from the legislative and executive.”

② Three distinct functions of Government

He classified state power into three categories.

i) Legislative Power

the authority to make laws

ii) Executive Power

the authority to implement laws

iii) Judicial Power

the authority to interpret and apply the laws.

He argued that each should be functionally and institutionally independent to preserve liberty.

③ Inspiration for Modern Constitutional Design

His doctrine deeply influenced the U.S. Constitution (1787), where the founding fathers adopted separation of powers and checks and balance. Later, democratic constitution across the world followed similar lines.

Why Montesquieu is called the Aristotle of the 18th Century?

① Scientific and Empirical Study of Political Institutions:

Like Aristotle, Montesquieu treated politics as a scientific inquiry based on observation and analysis rather than speculation. He studied political systems in the light of geography, economy, and culture.

② Comparative Approach Similar to Aristotle

Aristotle compared 158 constitutions: Montesquieu compared republics, monarchies, and despotic states.

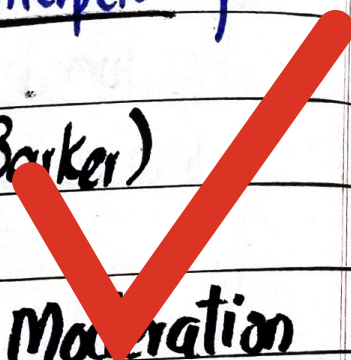
