Feminism has evolved from a movement for women's rights to a broader vision of gender justice.

The feminism in the 21st century needs to address the concerns of all genders and sexual orientations encapsulates a fundamental evolution in feminist thought and praxis. The contemporary feminism is increasingly defined by its engagement with intersectionality - a framework pioneered by scholar **Kimberle**

Crenshaw. This framework highlights how different aspects of a person's identity (such as gender, race, class, sexual orientation, disability, etc) intersect to create unique experiences of discrimination and privilege. Consequently, contemporary feminist movements, such as fourth wave and transnational feminisms, argue that a truly equitable world cannot be achieved without advocating for the liberation.

(Simone De Beauvoir)

This idea highlights that gender is socially constructed which extends to all gender identities. The greater visibility of LGBTQ+ communities and contemporary feminist movements argue that true equality cannot be achieved unless the concerns of all genders and sexual orientations are addressed.

CONTEMPORARY FEMINIST MOVEMENTS TO ADDRESS THE CONCERNS OF ALL GENDERS

1. Rise of Intersectional feminism

The shift from second-wave to intersectional feminism that is inspired by scholars like Kimberle Crenshaw. She argues that gender discrimination intersects with class, race, sexuality, and disability - oppression is never based on a single factor. This intersectionality makes it necessary to include all genders and sexual orientations in feminist discourse. The transphobia that a white cisgender woman does not face oppression as

to black trans woman.

Intersectionality simply means that we cannot treat racial inequality and gender inequality as separate issues."

(Crenshaw)

2. Inclusion of Transgender and Non-Binary Identities:

Modern feminism critiques rigid and binary ~~to~~ understanding of gender. It advocates the inclusion and rights of transgender. Movements like Transfeminism and scholars like **Julia Serano** argue that patriarchy harms them as much as women.

3. LGBTQ+ Rights as Part of Feminist Politics

Sexual minorities experience gender-based violence, social exclusion, and legal inequalities. Contemporary feminism recognizes that making LGBTQ+ rights a natural part of feminist commitments.

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4. Men Suffer from Patriarchy Too

While men have more power in a patriarchal system, they also suffer under it. They are told to show emotions and face high rate of work-related deaths and suicide. Feminism that wants to end patriarchy helps liberate men too.

Patriarchy has no gender, it hurts men as well as women. (Bell Hooks)

5. Importance of Cultural Contexts

In many countries, people like Hijras and Khawajas community face legal and social discrimination. Global feminism must include these third-gender communities in their fight for rights.

Pakistan's Transgender Persons Act 2018 is considered a landmark step aligned with inclusive feminism.

6. Feminism is Human Rights Movement

Feminism is about basic human rights. Human rights belongs to everyone, regardless of gender sexuality. Therefore, feminism must include everyone.

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7. Economic Marginalization Across Gender Spectrum

Women, trans people, and queer individuals face pay gaps and job discrimination. The World Economic Forum's Gender Gap Report includes economic disadvantages linked with gender identity.

8. Representation in Institutions

Inclusive feminism fights for representation of all genders in parliament, media, and bureaucracy.

For example: New Zealand Parliament includes transgender lawmakers. Canada and Nordic countries promote gender-inclusive policies.

9. Digital Feminism

Online movements reveal harassment faced not only by women but also by queer individuals and even men. For example: ^{#TimesUp} #MeToo expanded to include stories from LGBTQ+ communities and male survivors.

10. Expanded Definition of Gender-Based Violence:

Modern feminist organizations argue that domestic violence

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bullying, workplace harassment, and rape affect diverse genders. UN Women now uses the term "gender-based violence" instead of violence against women only.

Reproductive Justice

Reproductive justice means the right to have or not have children, and to parent safely. This includes assisted reproduction for queer couples and stopping forced sterilization of trans people.

True gender justice cannot be achieved unless feminism works for every marginalized identity. Critically analyze the women vulnerabilities in the contemporary societies in the light of Modernization and Dependency theories. Also suggest the way forward to revamp women status globally.

Introduction

Despite global progress, women in contemporary societies continue to face deep structural vulnerabilities. These appear in economic participation, political representation, education, health and personal security. These vulnerabilities can be critically examined through two pivotal development paradigms: Modernization Theory and Dependency Theory. Modernization theorists argue that industrialization, education, and economic growth gradually improve women's status. In contrast, dependency theorists highlight how global power structures, colonial legacies and unequal economic relations keep (developing) trapped in cycles of poverty and subordination. A critical analysis of these theories shows that while modernization has opened new opportunities for women. It has produced new inequalities.

Similarly, dependency on global capitalist structures continues to deepen vulnerabilities for women in the Global South. To achieve true gender equity, a comprehensive and multi-level transformation is required.

CRITICAL ANALYSIS OF WOMEN'S VULNERABILITIES

Through the lens of Modernization

Theory:

Modernization Theory suggests that as societies evolve from traditional to modern, gender relations will progressively become more egalitarian through education, urbanization, and secularization.

Paradox of Education & Employment

Modernization increases women's access to education and formal employment. It often leads to a "double burden" where women are expected to fulfill professional roles.

It retains primary responsibility for unpaid domestic and care work. **UNESCO (2023)** reports that although female literacy increased

worldwide, 129 million girls remain out of school. It shows that modernization alone does not remove patriarchal barriers.

Technological Exclusion:

The digital revolution is a key modernizing force that has created a gendered digital divide. In rural and poor communities, they do not have access to crucial information, economic opportunities, or platforms for advocacy.

Commodification and objectification:

Modern consumer culture which is driven by media and advertising frequently commodifies women's bodies. It replaces traditional patriarchal controls with new forms of exploitation. Global fashion and beauty industries worth over \$500 billion profits from hyper-sexualized portrayals of women. It reinforces objectification instead of empowerment.

Modernization Increases New forms of Violence:

Urbanization increases domestic abuse, workplace harassment, sex trafficking and cyber-harassment.

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According to Amnesty International Survey, 38% of women in modern urban societies face cyber harassment and online abuses.

Through the lens of Dependency Theory

Dependency Theory critiques the global economic order that argue the exploitation of peripheral nations by core capitalist countries deepens inequalities.

Impact of Structural Adjustment Programs (SAPs):

SAPs imposed by international financial institutions forced cuts in public health, education, and subsidies. It privatized the social safety net which transfer the burden to women through increased unpaid care work. It reduced the access to essential services. Women form 80% of garment factory workers in Bangladesh and Cambodia, often earning less than \$3 per day, showing exploitation by multinational corporations.

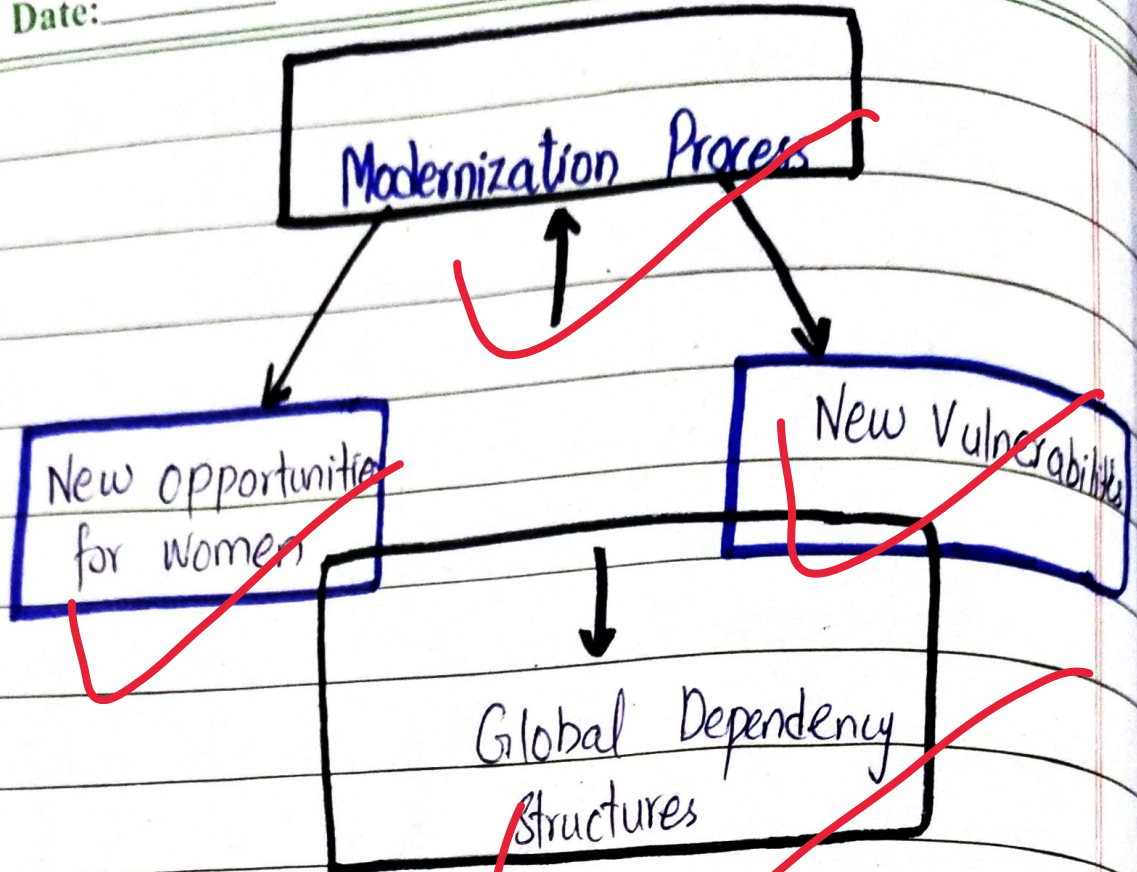
Feminization of Cheap Labor

Global supply chains exploit the comparative advantage of female labor in Export Processing Zones (EPZs). The women work is precarious, low-wage jobs with poor conditions. It reinforces their economic vulnerability. EPZs in Vietnam, Bangladesh, and Honduras employ mostly young women because they are considered cheaper and more obedient labor.

Gendered Impacts of Climate Change

As a crisis driven largely by the consumption patterns of the Global North.

Climate change intensifies women's vulnerabilities in dependent economies. It increases their labor burden for water and fuel collection and exposes them to climate-induced migration and conflict. After climate disasters like floods in Pakistan 2022, women suffered increased displacement, malnutrition, and violence due to weak economic systems.



WAY FORWARD: REVAMPING WOMEN'S STATUS GLOBALLY

① Education for Transformation:-

To revamping the women's status globally, implement gender-sensitive curricula from primary school to challenge stereotypes. It also promotes STEM education for girls. It foster critical media literacy to combat objectification.

② Gender-Sensitive Development Policies.

Governments must integrate gender equality into education, healthcare, budgeting, and national planning.

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Conclusion

The vulnerabilities faced by women in contemporary societies are neither natural nor inevitable. They are the product of entrenched patriarchal norms which highlighted by critiques of Modernization and Dependency Theory. A singular theoretical lens is insufficient. The path to revamping women's status, therefore, demands an integrated, feminist, and intersectional approach that that internalized gender biases and transform the external structures of global political economy. As the feminist scholar Bell Hooks aptly states:
