In his work, Discipline and Punishing Foucault & explains VV that institutions such as the state police and the judiciacy define what is deviant often seinforcing the interests of the powerful. This perspective is evident in the BlackLives Matter movement which challenge the labelling of Black protestors and deviant by the police or state authorities in the United States. In short, Foucault's ideas illustock that deriance is not merely a functional tool for - social
