Once detested in Middle East, Arab leaders admired the country's expertise in digital warfare and military discipline after the May conflict. Impressed by its battlefield victories, Arab leaders regarded Pakistan a formidable force.

(ii) Black out in Delhi influenced the psychological state of Indians during the conflict. The Black out disrupted communication systems and spread complete darkness across the city. People could not communicate with their relatives or loved ones, causing stress. Be relevant to original Passage While darkness psychologically created the state of fear. Thus, the people were in panic.

(iii) If Pakistan had not launched digital warfare after the missile retaliation, the conflict would have turned out differently. Pakistan's cyber attacks rendered several critical military infrastructure and systems ineffective. which although had huge military and capital setback to India, it caused no human loss. However, if Pakistan had not opened this

war front, the conventional war in skies and land would have escalated, causing huge human loss.

(iv) Traditional military force with air-defence systems costed five Rafale jets; missiles and artillery fire hit military installations and caused blackout in capital city. On the other hand, the digital warfare, disrupted communications, blinded satellites, disfunctional radars and command system. The cost incurred by the enemy was majorly inflicted by traditional military force; however, the decisive factor was Pakistan's digital warfare. It destabilized underlying control systems without which even traditional military force can not function.

(v) If the events of 10 May 2025 were to be viewed as a turning point, the episode has changed the meaning of 'power' in the 21st century. Power once seen as conventional military force has changed into technological and digital power. The traditional concept of firepower and military numbers have changed into technological advancement and cyber expertise.
