Post 1998 Era - Pakistan declared its nuclear weapons as deterrent.

2000-Present - As of 2023, Pakistan has an estimated 165 nuclear warheads.

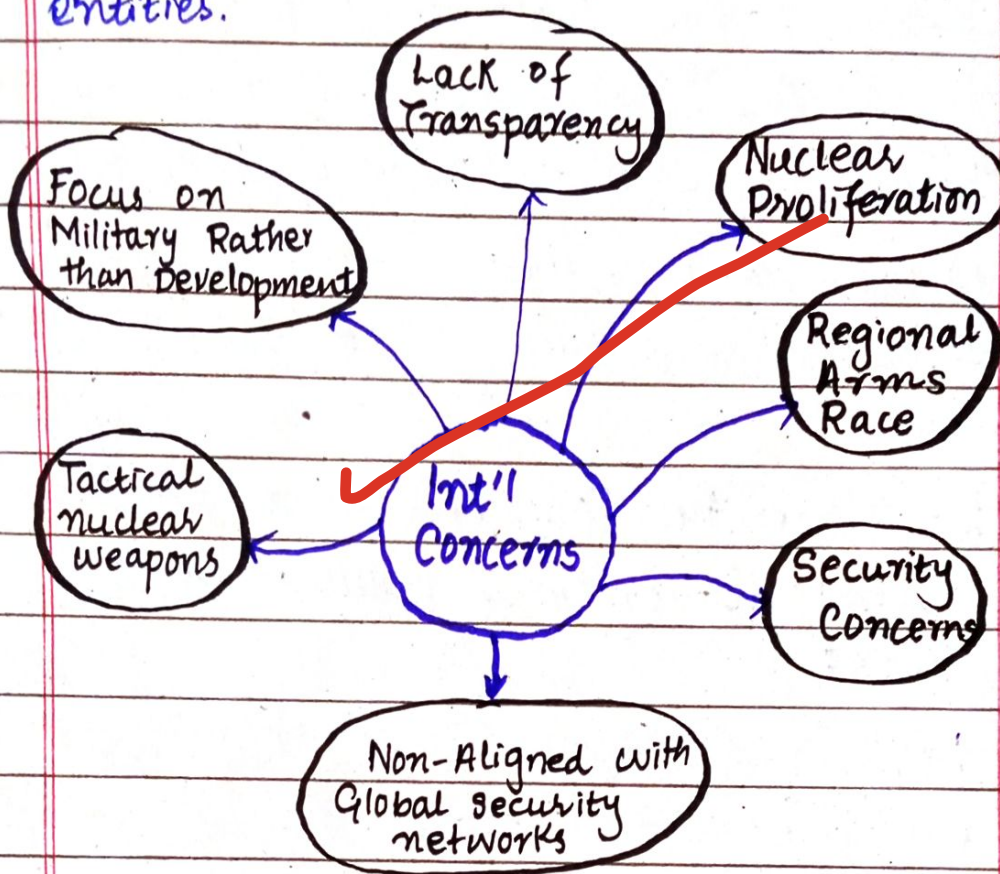

2. WHY IS PAKISTAN'S NUCLEAR PROGRAM IS CRITICIZED BY INTERNATIONAL ENTITIES?

Despite the program's importance for Pakistan's security, it has been

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criticized by international entities.



2.1. Nuclear Proliferation:

Pakistan is not a signatory of NPT, and it continued to develop nuclear weapons keeping in view the security dynamics. Apart from this, ~~Dh. Abdul Qadeer Khan~~ was accused of sharing nuclear technology with countries like Iran, North Korea, and Libya.

2.2. Regional Arms Race:

Pakistan started its nuclear program

to counter-balance India in the Region, so that Balance of Power in South Asia could be maintained. Pakistan's continuous development of tactical nuclear weapons is seen as a destabilizing factor as it escalates regional arms race with India.

2.3. Security Concerns due to Rising Terrorism & Insurgency Risks:

Pakistan is dealing with terrorism and insurgent groups for a long time. In 2025, Pakistan is ranked at number 2 in terrorism index. Critics argue that there are chances that nuclear weapons may fall into the wrong hands.

2.4. Lack of Transparency:

Critics argue that Pakistan's nuclear weapons lack transparency as Pakistan do not share detailed information about its nuclear arsenal, leading to speculations about its intentions.

2.5. Focus on Military Rather Than Development:

Critics argue that Pakistan is spending major portion of its budget on Defense capabilities. It is often seen as a ~~sub~~burden on ~~lingering~~ economy. This drains major portion of budget that should be allocated to other sectors eg health, education, and infrastructure.

2.6. Development of Tactical Nuclear Weapons:

Pakistan is continuously developing tactical nuclear weapons. These short-range, smaller, and battle-ready nukes are ~~considered~~ risky and there are chances of thefts or misuse. Moreover, their use in conventional warfare may escalate a full scale war.

2.7. Non-Aligned with Global Security Framework:

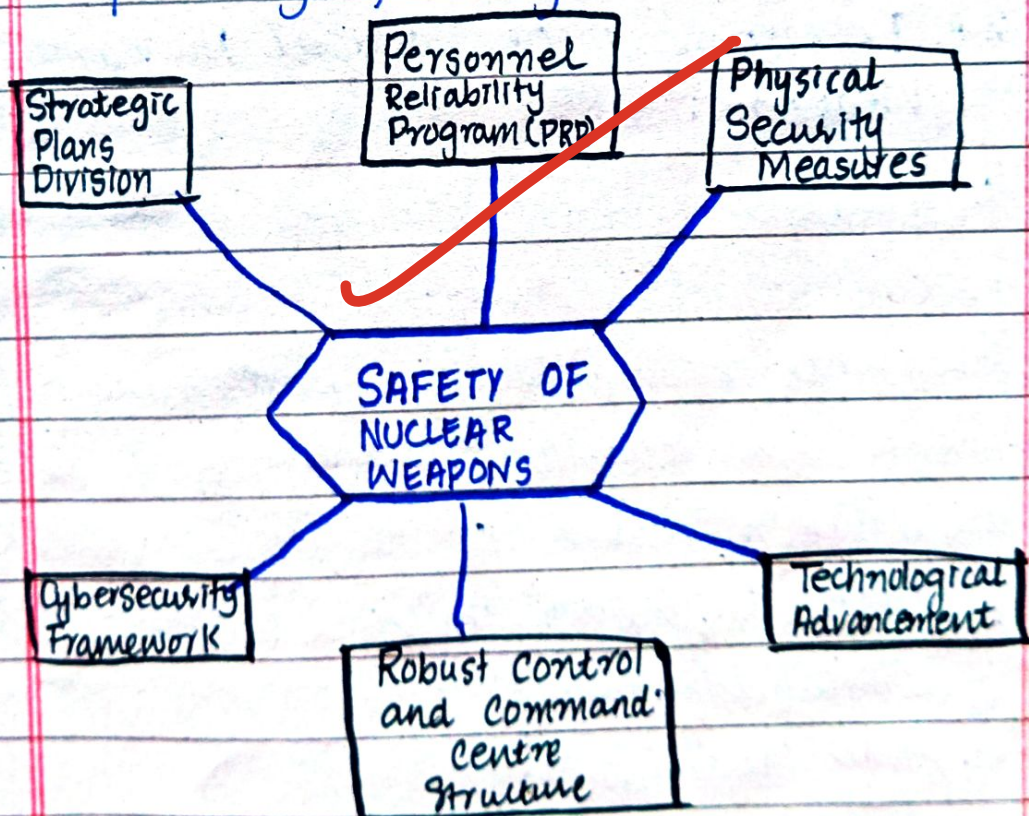
Pakistan is not a signatory of

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Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty (CTBT)
or agree to a Fissile Material Cut-off
Treaty (FMCT). Due to this, nuclear
doctrine of Pakistan is seen as
incompatible with global disarmament.

3. SAFETY OF PAKISTAN'S NUCLEAR PROGRAM:

Pakistan's nuclear program emphasizes safety and security of its nuclear weapons by following measures.



3.1. Physical Security Measures:

Pakistan employs a three-tiered

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Security System at its nuclear facilities, including "armed personnel, electronic surveillances, and biometric access control." These steps ensure only authorized individuals to access those sensitive areas.

3.2. Personnel Reliability Program (PRP):

Pakistan has a strict PRP that requires extensive background check, regular psychological evaluations, and monitoring of armed personnel working in nuclear facilities.

3.3. Strategic Plans Division (SPD):

The SPD maintains and manages nuclear assets. It conducts frequent drills and training for dealing with emergency situations.

3.4. Robust Command & Control Structure:

The National Command Authority (NCA) oversees every decision regarding nuclear weapons. It uses advanced technology to maintain control over nuclear weapons.

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2.5. Technological Advancement:

Pakistan is utilizing advanced technologies like radiologic detection system, to monitor and secure nuclear material during transport.

2.6. Cybersecurity Framework:

Pakistan has adopted a dedicated cybersecurity framework to protect nuclear weapons from hacking or being sabotaged.

Asia and maintaining security and sovereignty. Pakistan has a sophisticated system to secure these nuclear weapons, yet it is being criticized by international entities.

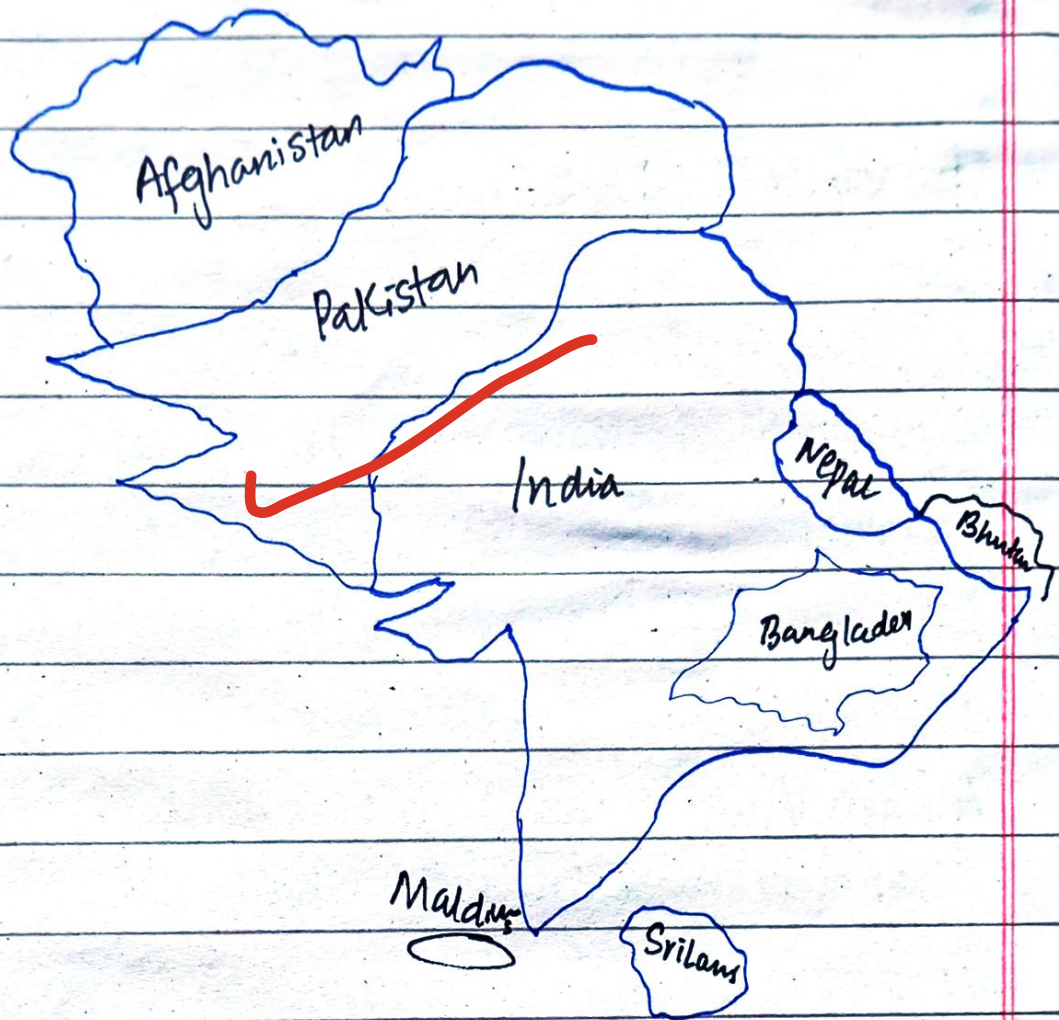
QUESTION # 03

2. SAARC:

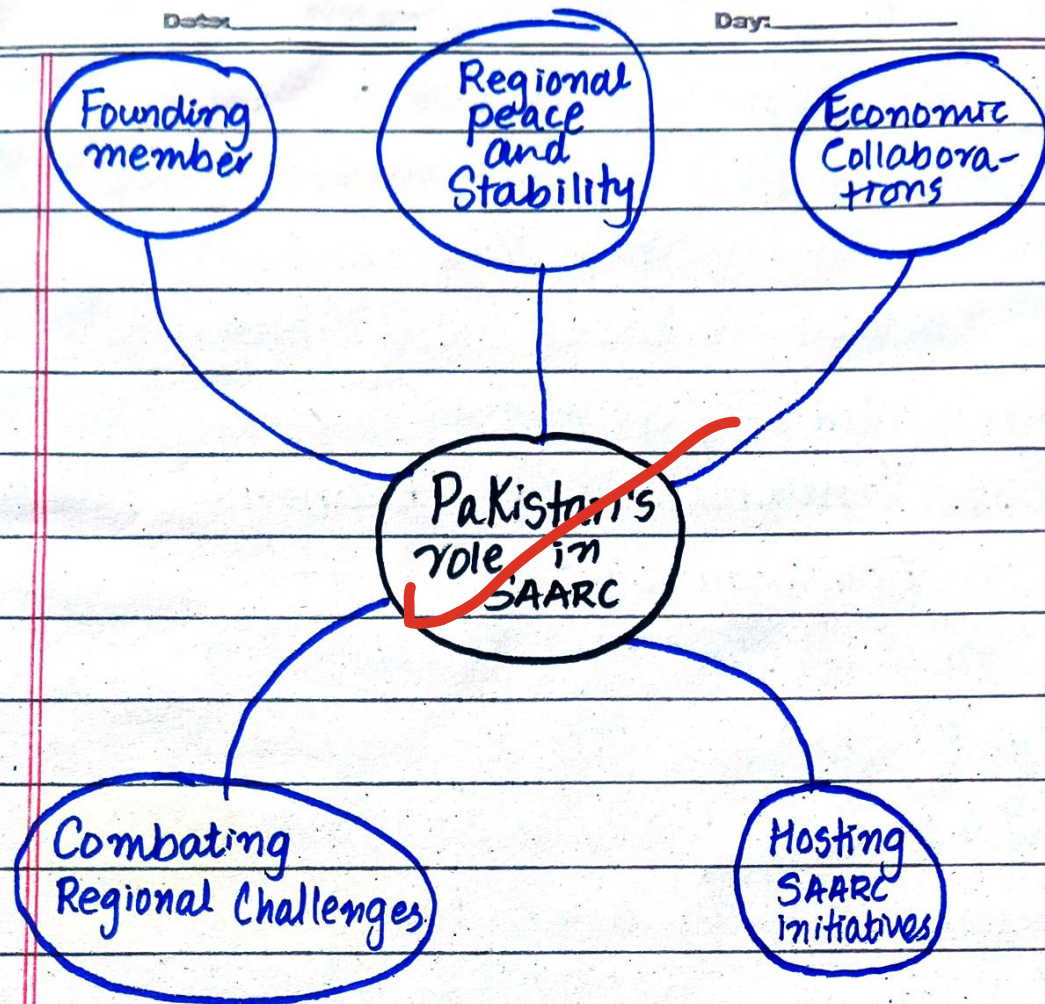

Pakistan has hosted various SAARC high-level meetings. It has also supported the SAARC

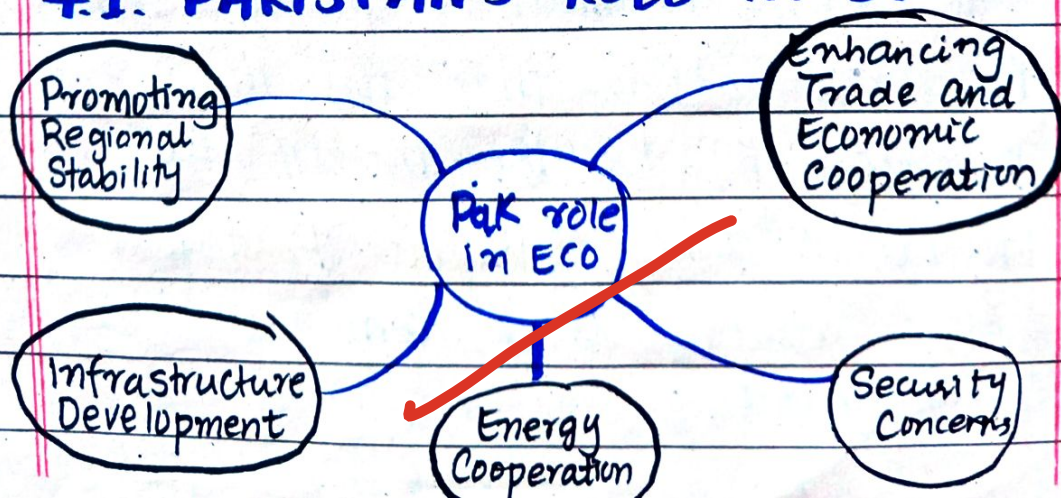
Development Fund (SDF) and advocated for its effective utilization.

4.15: Counter-terrorism and Security Cooperation:

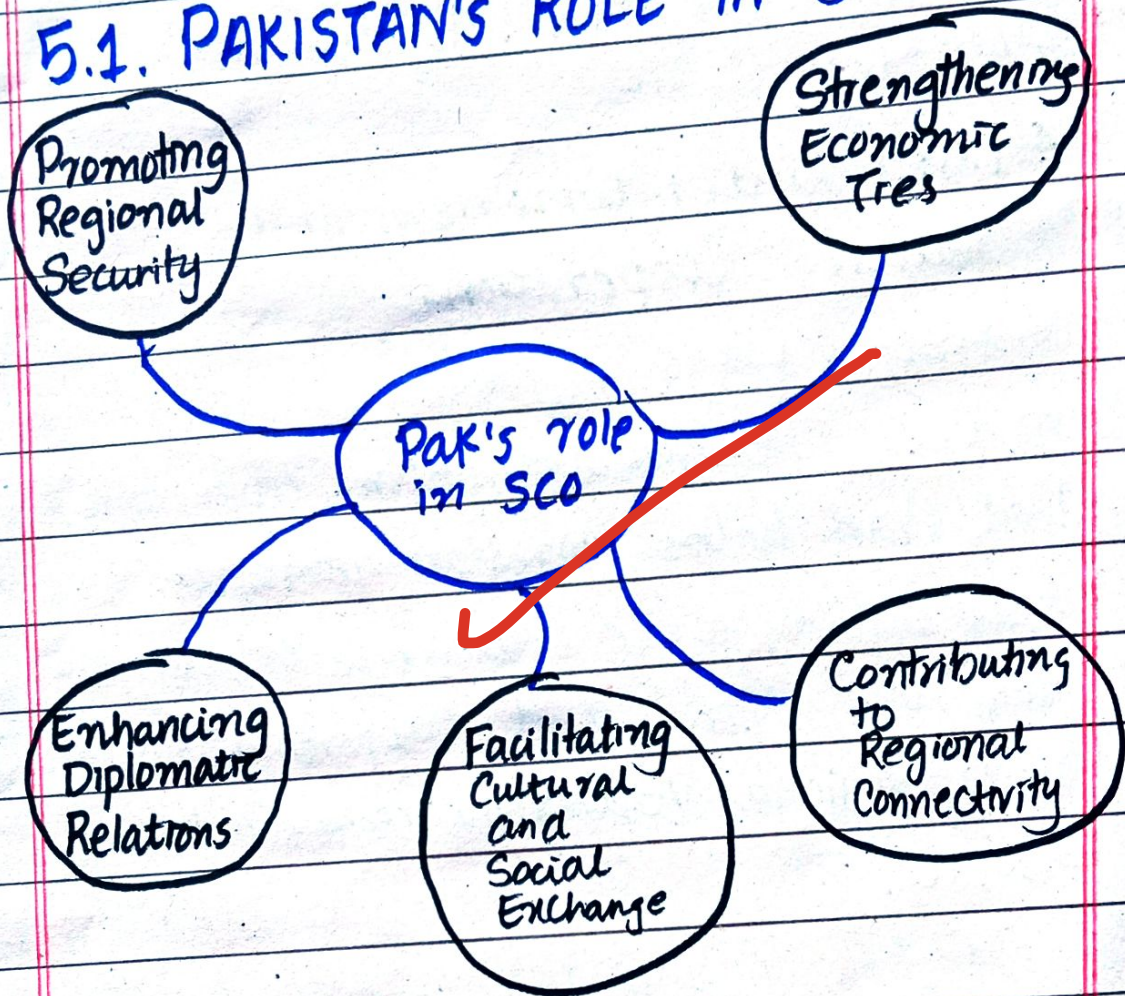

3. KEY CONTOURS OF DEMOCRATIC EVOLUTION:

3.1. Civil-Military Imbalance:

One of the major contour in democratiz evolution of Pakistan is Civil-military imbalance. Since inception, there were three major military coups (1958, 1977, and 1999). Civilian governments often operate under the shadow of military influence. This imbalance has undermined the democratic norms.

3.2. Weak Judicial Role:

Judiciary is one of the major pillar of democratic governments, but unfortunately, Judiciary has played a dual role in Pakistan's democratic journey. On one hand, courts legitimized coups under "Doctrine of necessity" while on the other hand became a tool for resistance during Lawyer's Movement.

3.3. Weak Political Institutions and Party Structures:

In Pakistan, political institutions for accountability, transparency etc are weak and party structure lack internal democracy. It is ruled by dynastic families (Bhutto - Sharifs) and feudal lords.

3.4. Constitutional and Legal Reforms:

The constitution of 1973 remains a cornerstone of Pakistan's democratic structure. Key reforms include 18th Amendment (2010) and Legal Framework Order (LFO). These reflect the constant tug of war between authoritarianism and democratic restoration.

3.5. Grassroot Movements and Public Activism:

Despite elite-driven politics, public resistance has played a key role in restoring democracy.

eg MRD against Zia and Lawyers Movement.

3.6. Free Media and Civil Society:

Media acts as watchdog of democracy. The rise of electronic media has created new spaces for democratic engagement.

Civil Society organizations have advocated for human rights etc.

3.7. Civilian Continuity Despite Challenges:

Since 2008, despite challenge Pakistan has seen democratic transitions. Though flawed but this continuity has allowed incremental reforms and strengthened public expectation for democracy.

The country is yet not a truly democratic state because of civil-military imbalance, institutional weakness, weak judiciary
