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In a classroom in Lahore, a teacher once asked her students to name the last book they had read for pleasure. Out of forty, only two raised their hands. The silence that followed captured more than embarrassment — it captured a generational shift away from the books. It reflects the alarming decline of reading habits among youth. In this modern age, where the human attention spans have shrunken, youth scroll through thousands of digital posts daily. Resultantly, the intellectual place, once held by books, is replaced by fast-paced entertainment. This shift is not merely due to overwhelming digital distractions but a cultural transformation of reading habits is also responsible for it. Socioeconomic disparities in providing access to books coupled with commercialization of education further accentuated this decline. Books — once the gateway to imagination and creativity — now struggle to compete owing to lack of literary exposures through media along with rising academic pressure being faced by the youth. Its consequences, however, are far-reaching. Poor reading habits are correlated with impaired critical thinking, widening social inequality and

weakening civic awareness — thereby threatening the cultural cohesion and intellectual capital. Keeping in view, it can be rightly argued that the decline of reading habits among youth is driven by technological and socio-cultural practices with far-reaching consequences. Therefore, it is imperative to implement targeted educational and societal policy interventions to revive a reading culture among youth.

To begin with, decline of reading habits has emerged as a global literacy alarm. It signals an urgent threat to the intellectual development of future generations. With increasing digital entertainment platforms, reading habits continue to decline among young people, across the world. Research by UNESCO warns that global voluntary reading rates among adolescents have dropped ~~to~~ by nearly 30% in the last decade. This decline is not limited to developing regions but even highly literate societies like South Korea, United States, and Finland report significant drops in leisure reading. The shrinking reading culture reflects a worldwide erosion of deep

literacy habits among youth.

Firstly, one of the most significant causes of declining reading habits among youth is the overwhelming presence of digital distractions and screen addiction. Due to smartphones, social media platforms and online gaming, the focused reading has been gradually replaced by the quick dopamine driven content. Instead of engaging with books, young people turn to digital feeds that assist reward constant scrolling. According to the Pew Research Centre (2023), nearly 95% of teens now own a smartphone and their daily screen time exceeds 7.3 hours. This elucidates that they have little space or time for reading. Moreover, these technologies are designed in a way to capture attention; for instance, TikTok uses an algorithm that pushes rapid, 15 second videos, creating a preference for instant gratifying entertainment. Resultantly, the digital environment actively reshapes the reading habits of an entire generation.

Furthermore, another major cause of declining reading habits among youth is the erosion of family reading culture. Children typically develop

their reading habits by observing adults at home. But, in many households today, digital entertainment has replaced books as the primary source of leisure. The Scholastic report (2022) reveals that children whose parents read regularly are likely to read four times more books annually. It highlights the powerful influence of familial habits on a child's reading trajectory. In Pakistan, for example, YouTube content, TV dramas and mobile browsing dominate family time, leaving limited opportunities for children to see reading practiced as a normal enjoyable activity.

This habit is naturally internalized by the children. Thus, the decline of family reading culture removes a critical foundation for developing consistent reading habits in the younger generation.

Along with this, a growing perception ^{among} of youth that reading is boring or unproductive has also contributed significantly to the decline of reading habits. In an era defined by instant outcomes and digital gratification, reading is often viewed as too slow, irrelevant or lacking

practical value. Many young people now prioritize activities that offer immediate rewards or benefits such as coding courses, skill-based content and online tutorials. The OECD study found that an increasing number of students perceive traditional reading as disconnected from modern career paths, thus reinforcing the belief that books are outdated tools in a modern world. As reading is gradually labelled as unproductive or old-fashioned, fewer young people invest time in it, thereby accelerating the reading decline of reading culture.

Also, the commercialization of education has further contributed to the decline in reading habits among youth. It shifted the focus of youth from intellectual development to academic outcomes. Many private educational institutions operate as competitive enterprises that define success by grades, admissions and test performance. Consequently, reading for pleasure is viewed as a low priority in favor of exam oriented teaching. A World Economic forum (2022) study found that schools prioritizing test scores over literary witness a

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30% drop in voluntary reading rates among students. It illustrates how educational priorities shape reading behavior. As a result, commercialization not only ~~shows~~ narrows the educational experience but also undermines the foundational role of reading in shaping intellectually curious learners.
