Q1 INDIA'S UNILATERAL WITHDRAWAL; IMPACTS ; POLICY OPTIONS FOR PAKISTAN

(I) Introduction

Owing to the incident in Phalgam in 2025 and its subsequent escalation, India unilaterally suspended the Indus Water Treaty. Despite its prior insulation from political escalation, the treaty was subjected to change. As a result, causing significant impacts on both countries at a domestic level, and consequent effects at an international level. To counter India's hostile stance, Pakistan must undertake a multi-level policy approach, if it wishes to stop India from violations.

(II) Treaty's Abeyance: Impacts On An International Level

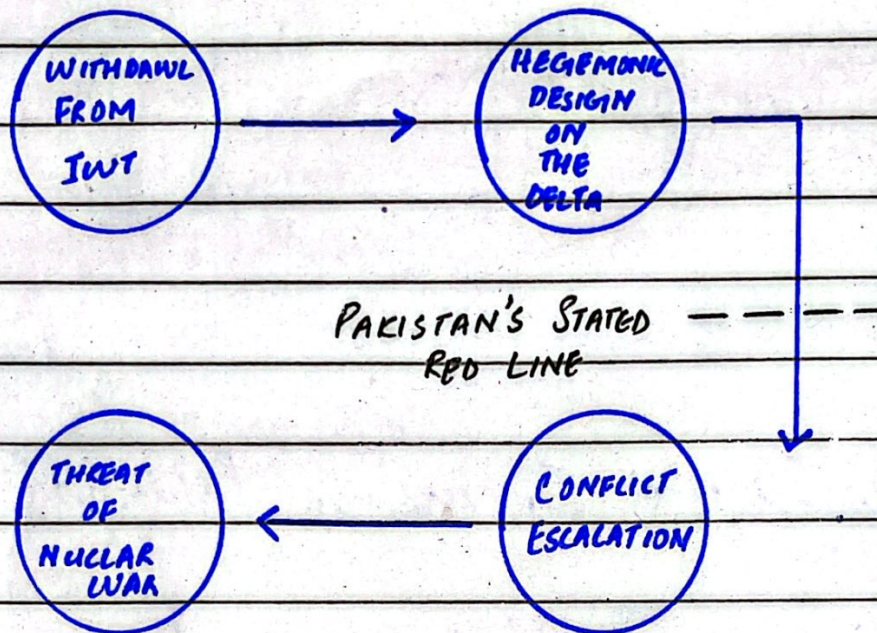
(C) Further Escalation of the Indo-Pak Conflict

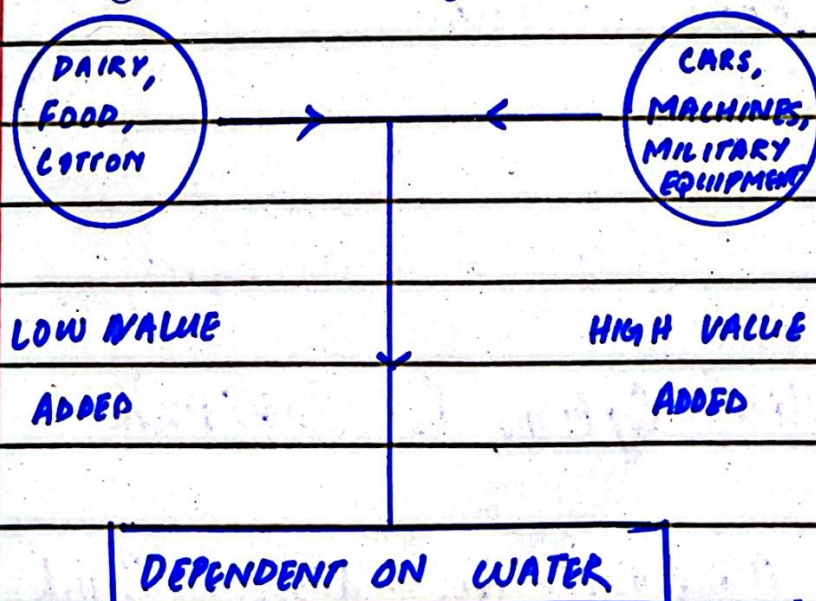
Indus Water Treaty is a threat to this sector. Pakistan's agriculture is extraordinarily dependent on these rivers.

Pakistan allocates miniscule resources towards disaster management. For the 2025-26 financial year, Pakistan allocated 1% federal.

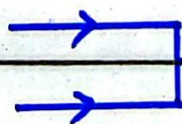
