However the impact is not limited to the individual. Force marriage are linked to major social problems such as domestic violence, early pregnancies, illiteracy, and poverty. Women and girls are especially affected, as they are often pulled out of school and deprived of independence and productivity. Thus, forced marriage is not only a violation of personal right but a barrier to social development.

Many families believe that a girl's marriage is tied to family honor, so they rush to marry daughters at young ages to protect reputation. In rural Sindh and South Punjab, for example, girls are often married off before 18 to avoid criticism from the community. According to UNICEF, 18%

Patriarchy is one of the strongest forces behind forced marriages in Pakistan. In many families, men controlling all major decisions, including when and whom a girl should marry. Women are often treated as dependents with no rights to choose their future. In provinces like Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Balochistan, fathers and elder brothers commonly finalize marriage without even informing the girl. Aurat Foundation report shows that many young brides were never asked consent. When mobility, education, and voice are restricted, force marriage becomes easier to impose. Ultimately, patriarchy maintains power structure while silencing women's basic rights and autonomy.

Illiteracy continues to fuel forced marriages in Pakistan. When parents ~~are~~ girls are uneducated they lack the confidence and awareness needed to reject unfair decisions. In 2025 rural areas of interior Sindh and Southern Punjab Southern Khyber Pakhtunkhwa still report high dropout rates among girls after primary school. According to the Pakistan Education Statistics 2024-2025 ~~many~~ families consider ~~st~~ schooling unnecessary for daughters. Without education girls remain unaware of their legal right and cannot challenge decisions imposed by family elder.

Economic hardship pushes many families to marry off daughters as a financial escape. In 2025, inflation and unemployment have increased poverty, especially in district of Tharpakar Rajanpur, and Kohistan. Some parents see early marriage as a way to reduce household expenses. Practices like Watta Satta — marrying daughter in exchange arrangements are still common in rural Punjab and KP. Families justify these decision as survival strategies, girls in lifelong dependency.

High population growth continues to worsen the cycle of forced marriage. In 2023 Pakistan's population has crossed 248 million, with many early marriages contributing to frequent childbirths. Girls married before 18 are more likely to have multiple children, increasing pressure on already struggling families. Areas with low access to family planning, like parts of Balochistan and South Punjab, show rising birth rates. This creates a chain reaction - more children, less education and greater vulnerability to forced marriages in the next generation.

Forced marriages often destroy a person's mental stability. When individuals are pushed into relationships without consent, they experience constant stress, anxiety, and depression. Many girls in Pakistan report feeling trapped, isolated, and hopeless after such marriages. Their creativity and productivity decline because they cannot focus on personal growth or goals. A 2024 mental health survey

by Rozan highlighted that many young bride lose self-confidence within the first year of marriage, showing how psychological damage becomes a silent but long-lasting consequences.

Forced marriage often becomes the foundation of domestic abuse. When one partner never agreed to the union, power imbalance deepens, and ~~emth~~ emotional or physical violence becomes common. In 2025, the Aurat Foundation and Shirkat Gah reported that a significant number of domestic violence cases ~~are~~ originate from forced or early marriages. Women in such households rarely have the power to resist or leave. As a result, the trauma becomes long-term affecting not just the victim but also children who grow up witnessing violence.

When girls are married off early without consent, their education ends abruptly.

Many families believe schooling is unnecessary once a marriage is arranged. In 2025, Pakistan Social and Living Standards Measurement (PSLM) data still shows a rise in female illiteracy in areas where early marriages are

Common, such as rural Sindh and KPK.
Once girls leave school, they lose access to
skills, independence, and opportunities. This

Early and forced marriages exposed
girls to serious health issues risks. Many become

high in areas with forced marriages. Young

creating long-term problems for both the mother

Forced marriages reduce women's role in the economy. When girls are married early, they lose the chance to pursue education, jobs, or entrepreneurship. In 2025, Pakistan's female labor force participation is still below 25% partly due to early marriage pressure. Families also suffer because uneducated, dependent women cannot contribute financially. Children raised in such environments often suffer from insecurity and stress. Reports from Pakistan's 2025 Family Welfare Association show higher rates of spousal separation and disputes in forced unions. Extended families also experience strain

and division. Instead of building harmony, forced marriages weaken social bonds and create instability that affects multiple generations.

Forced marriages do not just damage individual lives — they slow down Pakistan's national development. Early marriages often lead to more childbriths, which adds to the country's already high growth. This increase pressure on resources like food, health, and education. When girls are denied education and freedom, they become economically unproductive, reducing the country's skilled workforce. According to the Pakistan Economic Survey 2024-25, low female participant participation weakens GDP growth. Gender inequality also keeps society socially backward, as women remain excluded from decision-making and leadership. As a result, forced marriage hold back both social progress and economic advancement.

Education is the strongest tool to prevent forced marriages. When girls stay in schools they gain confidence, awareness, and decision-making power.

In 2025, many NGOs in Pakistan are promoting consent awareness in rural Sindh and KP, and Balochistan. Workshops, school campaigns, and community, and community sessions help families understand that marriage without consent is a violation of rights. ~~Education~~ Educated girls are more likely to resist forced decisions and build productive future. Expanding scholarships and literacy programs can break the cycle of silence and subordination.

Laws against forced marriage exist in Pakistan, but weak enforcement keeps the practice alive. The Child Marriage Restraint Act and Sections of the Pakistan Penal Code criminalize such unions, yet many cases go unreported.
